**Russian Steamer Captured.** LONDON, June 24.—A steamer, supposedly the liner Brussels, has been captured by a German submarine and taken to Zebrugge, said a Lloyd's dispatch.

The death rate from wounds in the war is less than one-half as great as it was a year ago. Dr. Jacques Bertillon, medical statistician in the French army, declares that by hard-ship and exposure the men have become so toughened that they can now stand twice as much as they could last year.
