NATATORIUM GROUND CHOSEN BY COUNCIL OF CITY OF HELIX

WORK WILL BEGIN AS SOON AS WEATHER WILL PERMIT. TO BE RUSHED.

Richmond estate and the council purchased two more of them and vacated Thurman street, between Concord and Columbia, making a site 110x250 for natatorium and grounds. Geier were elected construction committee. Sufficient funds have been donated to insure its completion.

LEIPSIK RIOTING REPORTED

Duchy of Brunswick Said to Be Under Martial Law.

BERNE, Switzerland, via London, June 29.—Reports have reached here that serious rioting occurred in Leipzig at the end of last week, and that about 1500 shops, chiefly those of bakers, butchers and provision dealers, were pillaged by mobs.

It is said that Czech soldiers brought from Austria fired upon the crowd, and that martial law has been proclaimed in Leipzig and the Duchy of Brunswick.

Medicians Predict Victory.

NOGALLEZ, Ariz., June 29.—Fifteen American refugees, including three women and several children, arrived from Magdalena, Vermillion and Empalme by train reporting civil treatment by the Mexicans enroute in spite of preparations for war. Yaqui Indians to the number of about 5000 are said to have passed north through Hermosillo during the past week. The impression among the refugees, however, was that the Yaquis would follow their usual procedure and return to their own country as soon as they had been issued arms and ammunition.

Circulars spread broad cast from Hermosillo by recruiting officers and brought here by refugees today contain a flamboyant call to arms. They say in part:

"No fighting will be necessary. Our brave troops will simply march northward, brushing the Gringos aside until our glorious tri-color floats from the dome of the capitol at Washington."
