Mexicans Will be Kept From Border

PATROL WILL BE TIGHTENED ALONG NEW MEXICO LINE; ORDERS ISSUED.

COLUMBUS, N. M., July 3.—Mexicans are to be kept from approaching too closely to the American border in the New Mexican border patrol district, according to orders issued by Colonel H. C. Sikes, commanding the district, as a result of the firing from the Mexican side on a detachment of United States cavalrymen.

Investigation developed that the marauders probably were part of a Mexican scouting party sent from Azconson, 70 miles south, to reconnoiter the frontier, and who fired only when challenged by American sentries. Reports reaching here from the field in the last few days have indicated that a Mexican intelligence officer is situated there for the purpose of keeping track of American troops and supplies from the border. Coupled with these reports, the Carranza garrison at that point has been increased materially recently.

Hoof-prints indicated that the detachment was composed of about a dozen mounted men, and several empty cartridge shells of the type used by troops of the de facto government were found near the scene of the shooting.

PHILADELPHIA, July 4.—The prosecution of offenders under the Harrison anti-narcotic law received a setback when Judge Thompson, in the federal district court, in ordering the acquittal of two defendants, declared that the possession of "dope," even in large quantities, without evidence of a sale or an attempted sale, was not a violation of the law.

The court acted under a recent decision of the United States supreme court. Judge Thompson, in deciding whether the cases of Robert Martin and Thomas Rowan should go to the jury, said:

"I recognize the importance of the provisions of the Harrison act being enforced, but I cannot take your construction of the decision of the supreme court without going into the teeth of that decision. The decision of the supreme court, as I read it, is that mere possession is not prima facie evidence or presumptive evidence of a criminality against the Harrison law. The evidence offered in this case has not measured up to the proof required to permit the case to go to the jury, and therefore I am obliged to direct the acquittal of the defendants."

For a conviction the government relied on the circumstantial evidence of a large quantity of drugs, scales, small envelopes and other paraphernalia used in the dispensing of drugs, which were found in the possession of the men. There are now 49 cases pending in the federal court in this city, in which the evidence is similar to that adduced in the case decided. It is understood that the government will not call these cases for trial until the matter is threshed out.

General Francisco Gonzales, Juarez commander, telegraphed General Jancinto Trevino at Chihuahua for instructions and it is probable Cooke will be turned over to the American authorities today.

HUGHES BETTING FAVORITE.

Wall-Street Man Has \$60,000 to Waager Against \$50,000 on Wilson.
NEW YORK, July 4.—Little more is to be bet on President Wilson's chances of re-election was reported in the financial district, but followers of Hughes were ready to quote odds. Chester Thompson, the stakeholder for many wagers placed on the curb, let it be known that he had \$60,000 of Hughes money in sight to be put up against \$50,000 by backers of the president. This was an individual offer and was said in the street to be the largest single wager mentioned in a presidential campaign in many years.

In betting quarters it was said it is too early in the campaign to size up the extent of the bets likely to be made. Owing to the big profits made in stocks and manufacturing in the past year the close watchers of sporting developments predict the betting will reach greater proportions than on any similar occasion.

Dominicans Talk Peace.
WASHINGTON, July 3.—American Minister Russell, in Santo Domingo, notified the state department that peace negotiations were in progress between the belligerent Dominican factions.
Overtures to the rebels led by General Araya were made by a commission representing the government faction.

GORGAS TO FIGHT FEVER.

General Leads Party on Trip to South America.

NEW YORK, July 4.—General William C. Gorgas, U. S. A., is chairman of the yellow fever committee constituted by the International Health Board of the Rockefeller Foundation, which sailed recently on the steamer Albatross for a trip to various points in South America where yellow fever is still supposed to exist. To undertake this work General Gorgas has obtained four months' leave of absence from the army.

The other members of the commission are Dr. Henry R. Carter of the United States public health service, clinician; Dr. Juan Guiteras head of the public health service of Cuba, clinician and general adviser; Dr. C. G. Lyster, clinician; Dr. Eugene H. Whitmore, pathologist; Dr. William Wrightson, sanitary engineer, and Harry H. Wakefield, secretary.

The commission will go first to Caracas, Venezuela, and then to Colon, Panama. It will cross the Isthmus of America, making a number of stops, especially at Guayaquil, Ecuador, one of the chief points where yellow fever is still prevalent. The commission will make particular investigation also of conditions in Manaus, Pernambuco and Bahia, in Brazil.

The Rockefeller Foundation announced that the sending out of this commission is the result of studies begun in July, 1914, by the international health board of the sanitary needs and responsibilities growing out of the opening of the Panama canal. Organization of the yellow fever commission was delayed by war conditions. The announcement says that this commission "will make a survey of the infected regions for the purpose of determining the doubtful endemic centers and of ascertaining what measures may be necessary and feasible for the eradication of the infection in those communities on which the responsibility for the presence and spread of yellow fever is found to rest."
