JUDGE FEE WAS THE ORATOR OF THE DAY AT ECHO JULY 4TH

ARLINGTON BALL TEAM DEFEATED ECHO; GRAND BALL WAS FEATURE OF CELEBRATION.

(East Oregonian Special.) ECHO, Ore., July 7.—The celebration held here on the 4th was one of the best events of its kind held here for several years. The day was perfect. About two thousand people were present to participate in the gala day. Pendleton, Nolin, Stanfield, Hermiston and Umatilla were all represented besides many from Arlington, who accompanied the Arlington baseball team here.

At an early hour the inhabitants were awakened by the report of the shooting guns and there was not an idle moment the remainder of the day. Music was furnished by the Echo band, which played at short intervals the entire day. A parade of several floats and many decorated automobiles, horsemen and pedestrians was formed in front of the city hall and wended its way to the school house grounds where the throng found seats. A very interesting program was rendered. Judge James A. Fee was the orator of the day.

An hour at noon was devoted to lunch. Many took advantage of the beautiful grove surrounding the school building to eat their lunch in its shade.

In the afternoon all kinds of races were held but the event of the afternoon was the ball game between Arlington and the Echo nine, the Umatilla county champions, which was watched by a thousand people. The score was 7 to 3 in favor of Arlington.

The crowning event of the day was the ball at night in the new city hall. The grand march was led by Miss Gertrude McCoy, the goddess of liberty, and F. T. George, the master of ceremonies for the day. Dancing continued until 12 o'clock midnight.

During the entire afternoon there were free entertainments by the picture show in the new theater. The ball game was free. The town was appropriately decorated and old glory waved from every building.

There was not the slightest accident to mar the day.
