CHICAGO WHEAT MEN DYED-IN-WOOL BULLS

CHICAGO, July 8.—The more conservative, as well as the best posted men in the wheat market at Chicago are dyed-in-the-wool bulls—for a short pull. They advance the opinion that farmers are unlikely to sell their new wheat around prices now bid. They say that in case the weather continues favorable and the winter wheat is harvested and threshed without being damaged in any way by rain, there will be a rush of buying from abroad that will surprise not only the bears, but the bulls as well.

With our new winter wheat nearly 10c per bushel below the Canadian wheat, it is expected that foreigners will be attracted by the great difference in price.

There were quite a number of unfavorable threshing returns received today.

Wichita, Kan., again attracted considerable attention by its receipts of new wheat, the arrivals there amounting to 40 cars, of which 21 cars were reported as contract grade.

While the Minneapolis market failed to reflect any uneasiness there as to the possibility of black rust on account of high temperatures and dews

at night, a message was received from there saying that the wheat changing hands is going into strong concern.

John Washburn, president of the Washington-Crosby Milling company, and who was on the board of trade today, said that the demand for flour is much better—not only on domestic account, but that they are somewhat encouraged by the improved foreign inquiry.

TROOPS TO GET EXTRA PAY.

Foreign Service Will Add 20 Per Cent for Men of Rank.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—Extra pay for foreign service will be allowed the American troops serving across the Mexican border under a decision by Controller Warwick of the treasury. Enlisted men will receive 20 per cent additional and officers 10 per cent. The controller also gives the opinion that government employees who enlist in the national guard are entitled to full pay from their civil position for the first 30 days of their service, except that the combined salaries of officers will be subject to the \$2000 limitation provided by law.

NEW YORK, July 8.—Residents of Eastrock Heights, N. J., were excited at the arrest of William J. Zuber, recently a candidate for the board of freeholders and a prominent real estate broker, on a charge of robbery. Policeman John J. Murphy testified before William I. Schweikert, justice of the peace, that he saw Mr. Zuber leave the store of the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company, and that he had three cans of condensed milk, a pound of butter and a pocket full of keys. Mr. Zuber owns the building in which the tea company is located. The company has been repeatedly robbed, and five clerks have been discharged in the last four months. As a result of the robberies Policeman Murphy kept especially close watch. Mr. Zuber was held in \$1000 bail to answer the action of the Bergen county grand jury. He retired from the butcher business 10 years ago, and, in addition to his candidacy, he served on a commission to adjust a dispute over a meadowland.
