**Wheat Prospects in
Morrow Exceptional**

(By Hyman H. Cohen.)
HEPPNER, Ore., July 12.—The biggest crop since 1901. That sums up the wheat crop situation in the north end of the county, so far as the present outlook is concerned. The bigness of the crop is especially noticeable in the vicinity of Ione and Lexington, with the former showing unusually good prospects.

The present crop showing in the north end of the county is exceptional, in view of the conditions that existed a short time previous to the recent showers.

In the Gossberry and Eight Mile countries the situation is of similar trend. All of these will have far better crops of wheat than anyone had anticipated a short time ago, or could have believed possible.

The alfalfa crop in the north end of the county is likewise much better than a few weeks ago. In fact, at this time it is about normal.

Not So Good in South End.

In the south end of the county and all through the better land sections, the situation has been improved during recent days, but still the outlook is not quite as good as might be expected, in view of the excellent showing in the so-called poor land sections of the north end of the county.

However, with the better showing in the north end, Morrow county is at present showing wheat crop prospects better than a year ago, taking the county as a whole.

The supply of weeds is also far above the normal, and in some quarters this is causing apprehension.

Harvest is fully two weeks later than normal.

Stanfield has the honor of being the only city in the county which pays its chief of police in alfalfa. It is no joke, either. Chief of Police Dave Deavert will testify to this. While all of his pay is not in alfalfa, nevertheless each quarter of the year he draws his alfalfa pay. In addition to whatever other monies that the city of Stanfield appropriates for the services of Chief Deavert, he is entitled to all the alfalfa that grows in the streets. To secure his pay he is compelled by ordinance to harvest the crop of hay. His salary, therefore, fluctuates according to the season. This year it promises to be the biggest on record.

Paying a chief of police in alfalfa is only one of the natural events in the city of the project. Alfalfa is king here and none disputes the reign of the king. This season the crop of alfalfa in the project section is the biggest ever known.

Large Area of Alfalfa.

All told, on the Furnish-Coe project there are about 10,000 acres. Just about half of these, or about 5,000 acres, are at present growing alfalfa; and it is stated that about 2,500 acres more will be producing the king of grasses next season, because settlement is very rapid.

In company with Lloyd Riches, editor and publisher of the Stanfield Standard, and the resident representative of the project, I saw the wonderful results of irrigation on what was formerly the Umatilla desert.

This year's crop of alfalfa on the project will undoubtedly be the best to date. The first cutting has averaged close to 2 1/2 tons to the acre, and this season everyone around Stanfield expects to secure four cuttings.

From desert to the finest watermelons within the space of one season is the record established here. O. T. Lockridge actually grew watermelons last season on raw desert land of the previous year, and these melons were famed for their quality wherever exhibited.

Cherries Make Fine Showing.

Then there is M. C. Baragar, who has set a few records in the growing of cherries, the keeping quality of which is said to be sufficient to take them across the continent and back and still leave them in marketable condition.

While the Stanfield section is not going to have any peaches for visitors or the market this year because of the very hard frost at blossoming time, and for which the new community was not prepared, there is not the slightest doubt that one of these fine fruits—and the time is not so far distant as some might imagine—Stanfield is going to employ many hundreds of people packing fruits and vegetables for shipment. Stanfield is one of the earliest producing sections.

Stanfield has another distinction. It is N. Stanfield, for whom the town was named, is the largest feeder and shipper of sheep and lambs in the United States. At this time he has purchased approximately 400,000 head of sheep and lambs. He will feed these in various parts of the western country, but a very considerable portion of his business is done right here in his home town of Stanfield. In all, it is stated that he will handle about 500,000 head of sheep and lambs during the coming season. And Mr. Stanfield is a banker, too.

BLACK RUST BUGABOO IS HELD UP BY BEARS

CHICAGO, July 12.—In the opening of the pit, black rust reports continued to augment higher movement for wheat prices. Damage reports were received from many sections in the wheat belt and provided considerable snap to the market. Today's affair was based principally on domestic crop conditions, as they apparently are wielding a dominant influence just now.

Nothing of an important nature developed in the foreign news and the movement of old wheat stocks continued under favorable conditions.

Toward the close, some contradictory reports concerning the rust were received from responsible houses, which have sent special investigators in the field. Traders in their excitement over the rust scare, seemed temporarily to lose sight of other influences that might work in opposition to the present upward movement. This was demonstrated mid-

BEST QUALITY OF HOGS ARE FIRM AT \$8.80

UPWARD TURN LIKELY TO ACCELERATE SHIPMENTS IN PORTLAND YARDS.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 12.—The surmise that Monday's high hog prices would be short lived has not so far borne fruit, though, as one stockman put it, "no one can tell what a day may bring forth!"

As yet there is no downward tendency, prime animals going at \$8.80 and light stock ranging down to \$7.25, but this for only 130 pound swine.

Chicago opened at \$9.65@10.20 for heavy mixed, \$9.50@10.20, rough, \$9.45@9.60, and light at \$8.50@10.05. It will be seen, therefore, that for best stock the Portland market is but 85 cents below that of the greatest pork city in America.

One reason given for the local inflation is that there is a large demand for hogs to feed American soldiers on the Mexican border—a market of present creation, but yet one which may have longer life than surface indications would lead the thinking to expect.

Appeal Made for Poland.
WASHINGTON, July 12.—Formal appeal has been made to all the warring powers by the United States through American ambassadors, the state department announced, to make mutual concessions for shipment of relief supplies to Poland.

Under date of July 7 the American government sent notes to its ambassadors in Austria, France, Germany, Great Britain and Russia, asking that relief measures be taken for the famine sufferers.
