INTERVENTION NOW A MISTAKE SAYS JORDAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 12.—"To intervene in Mexican affairs at the present time, using our own mistakes as a basis for intervention, would be a blunder which, among other nations, would tend to destroy all our moral prestige," said Dr. David Starr Jordan upon his return from an interview at the border with prominent Mexicans with a view to adjusting Mexican troubles.

Dr. Jordan declares that investigation shows the Mexican revolutionary movements are a necessity in the modernizing of the government by the elimination of archaic and harmful remnants of the old Spanish regime. In the states not affected by the war there is entire order, schools have been established, prohibition has been put into effect by some states and a new growth of constructive citizenship is evident. Even in the war-ridden states, says Jordan, a staff for order has been made, and out of the revolutions has grown a desire to make Mexico pay its own way instead of burrowing money at ruinous rates.

Jordan advocates the patrol of the border by both American and Mexican troops.

"FINEST" EAGER FOR WAR

NEW YORK, July 12.—At the conclusion of their two weeks of military training at Fort Wadsworth, Staten Island, 250 New York policemen agreed that they would rather go to Mexico as soldiers than to return to their beats as patrolmen.

"These fellows would be as efficient as any of the soldiers in the regular army," Inspector Cornelius C. Mahoney said. "I would be pleased to take them to the border because I know they would be able to take care of themselves."

Russians Lure in Poles

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 12.—Official announcement was made here that the Russian forces which recently evacuated Kermanshah, Persia, had been overtaken by the Turks and put to flight after a battle of seven hours.

The Russian offensive on the Taurus sector of the Caucasus front undertaken to arrest the Turkish advance, has collapsed.



ADMIRAL SIR PERCY SCOTT.

LONDON, July 11.—The announcement that Admiral Sir Percy Scott has been appointed to take charge of the whole service of anti-aircraft guns for the defense of London against Zeppelins, has been welcomed by the public.

Admiral Scott is one of the best authorities on heavy ordnance in England and is famous as an inventor. He retired from the navy two

years ago with the rank of rear admiral. He is noted for his pugnacity and independence. He is one of the men who fought for the construction of dreadnaughts when Lord Beresford opposed the large ships.

He invented the night signal apparatus now used by the British navy, and an improved type of gun carriage. He was in command of the naval brigade in the famous siege of Ladysmith in the Boer war. He has also seen service in Ashanti, the Congo, China and Egypt.

He was born in 1855 and entered the navy in 1866.

FIRE IN HOSPITAL FATAL

Little Fever Patient Dies From Shock After Rescue From Blaze.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., July 12.—Arnold Barton, 5 years old, died of shock; three panic-stricken patients and one nurse who jumped from the third-story windows were seriously injured, and another nurse was burned as she ran through a blazing hallway to the rescue of one of her charges, when fire swept the second and third floors of the Deaconess Hospital here.

Clarence Barton, father of the Barton boy, was at the hospital when the fire broke out, and carried the child to the street. The boy, who was a typhoid fever patient at the hospital, died in his father's arms as they reached the sidewalk.

Thirty other patients were rescued.

MOB BANISHED BY POSSE

Raiders of Kansas Jail Put on Train and Told to Leave County.

WAKEENEE, Kan., July 12.—Two members of a mob estimated at 125 persons were shot five miles east of here in a clash with a posse of about 75 citizens. The mob had stormed the Wakeeney jail and released a man who had been sentenced to a charge of carrying concealed weapons. Members of the raiding party were placed on an eastbound train and ordered to leave the county.

The mob that raided the jail locked the sheriff into one of the cells. He was released and let the posse.

African Port Occupied

LONDON, July 12.—General Smuts, in command of the British forces in German East Africa, has occupied Tanga, according to a statement issued by the war office. The Germans offered only slight resistance.

Tanga is the second most important port on the coast of German East Africa and is the terminus of the railroad which the Germans were building into the interior at the outbreak of the war.

Mills To Pay Families

OREGON CITY, Ore., July 12.—Families of guardsmen who were employed in the local mills of the Crown-Willamette Paper Company will be cared for by the mill as long as the Oregon soldiers are away from home.

Mill officials have found 11 families which were left by guardsmen employed in the local plant. The money will be paid to the wives of the men, the mill giving 25 days' pay a month less \$15 paid by the government to the soldiers.

The Crown-Willamette mills and the Huxley Pulp & Paper company are holding jobs open for men now at the border.

American Boat Hits Mine

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—The American tank steamer Gold Shell, owned by the Shell Oil company of California, struck a mine off Bordeaux and was "badly damaged," according to a cablegram to the general office of the company here. The vessel left Philadelphia June 26, for Bordeaux with gasoline.

Advices received here did not give the date of the accident, but officials said it must have occurred yesterday or early today.

Call to Pulpit Accepted

MISSOULA, Mont., July 12.—Rev. H. H. Griffith, pastor of the Calvary Christian church here, has accepted a call from the First Christian church of Portland, Ore., it was announced here. He will go to Portland September 1.

Rev. H. H. Griffith has been filling the pulpit in the First Christian church here for several weeks. It was made vacant about June 1, when Rev. George Darke, formerly of Terre Haute, accepted another call. Several parsons preached here after the departure of Rev. Mr. Darke and one call was issued, but the pastor was not able to come.

Will Urge Preparedness

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Senator Lane is preparing to offer a Columbia submarine naval base amendment to the naval appropriation bill on the floor of the senate where he will present the matter and urge that a plan be made for naval preparedness on the Columbia.

Logging Camps Resume

ASTORIA, Ore., July 12.—Several of the logging camps in the Lower Columbia river district resumed operations following the week's shutdown. A few of the camps, however, will not start up until the logs which they have in the water have been handled.

The Klak & Larkin Co. camp on the Upper Naselle river has about 2,000,000 feet of logs which it is floating down stream by the operation of splash dams. It is expected the drive will be finished this week and then the cutting of timber will be resumed.

LOCAL BOY MAKING SPECIAL STUDY OF HISTORY OF WORLD

FOLSOM TALLMAN REGISTERS FOR SUMMER SESSION OF THE U. OF O.

Other Umatilla County Students Will Stay Over to Take Up Special Work This Season. Summer School Shows Increase of 66 Per Cent Over Last Year.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 12.—(Special.)—Folsom Tallman of Pendleton, is one of the students registered for the summer session of the University of Oregon. He is specializing in history, taking courses in American statesmanship under Dr. Schafer and Backgrounds of European War under Dr. Clark of the University, and is also taking a course in Shakespeare under Dr. J. Duncan Speth of Princeton University. Other students from Umatilla county are G. R. Robinson, of Weston, and Ruth Rothrock of Athena.

The university summer school this year shows an increase in attendance of more than 66 per cent over last year, and more than 100 per cent over the year before, constituting one of the most rapid gains in size in such a short period ever made by an established institution in the state. The summer school has been in existence eleven years, but its great spirit in growth dates like that of other departments of the university, from the time of the withdrawal of the Oregon educational institutions from the field of politics, and from the establishment of a high standard of graduate work in all the summer courses.

The summer students are said to average more than 20 years of age, many of them being successful men and women in many lines of work.

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 12.—One man in the hospital, another is under arrest though out on bail, and others are fugitives as a result of the strike which affects the three Montezuma shingle mills. The men hurt is Peter Lavettson, a strikebreaker. W. V. Simmons, who came into town with a revolver looking for the man who had attacked Lavettson, was the man arrested. The names of the men who attacked Mr. Lavettson are either unknown or not made public. He says he was attacked by six or more men shortly after leaving work for home. He is not injured seriously. The strike started about July 4. There was only a day or two of shutdown, the mills obtaining new men for the old wages.

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AL WANTS HIS \$25 BACK; SAYS HE WAS VICTIM OF POLICE

TELLS COUNCIL HE WAS NOT GUILTY OF VIOLATING LIQUOR LAW.

Imposed Upon by Detective Who Had Been Guest of Hotel; Colored Bootblack Makes Plea; No Action Taken on Request for Return of Fine on Richardson.

Al Richardson, colored bootblack at the Hotel St. George, appeared before the council last evening and asked for the return of the \$25 which he paid as a fine last week on a charge of selling liquor. He declared he was not guilty, saying he was imposed upon by a detective who had been a guest of the hotel and who sent him to the drug store to secure quinine and alcohol for use on a sore hand. Councilman Phelps expressed himself as believing the detective was much more guilty than Richardson and others were inclined to put the blame on the drug store for permitting him to secure the alcohol without making affidavit. Mayor Best explained that the future to secure Richardson's signature was claimed by the drugstore to be an oversight as he had given Richardson a pencil with which to sign. The mayor cross-questioned Richardson as to his knowledge of the law and stated that, having purchased alcohol before and made affidavit, he must have known that he was violating the law when he secured the liquor without signing. No action was taken on the request.

King of Annam Deposed

PARIS, July 12.—Duy-Tin, the 16-year-old king of the French protectorate of Annam, on the China sea, has been deposed as a result of a revolt of Annamites at Quang-Nam, which he has been accused of having fomented.

The governor general of French Indo-China reports that the outbreak was suppressed quickly and the king arrested near Hue. He is succeeded by Prince Hun-Dao, who has just been crowned.

Bankers' Opinions Differ

NEW YORK, July 12.—A wide divergence of opinion among the banks of the country as to whether the federal reserve act has been successful after a year's operation is shown in a report issued by a New York trust company, which has just completed a nation-wide survey of the attitude of banks toward the act.

More than 5000 replies were received to the queries sent out, 1760 of them being favorable, 177 unfavorable, and 1821 non-committal.

Railroad Plans Adopted

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 12.—Plans and specifications for the proposed Roseburg & Eastern Railroad were adopted by the city council here following their presentation by the city engineer. Bids for the construction of the railroad probably will be asked late in the present week. Although not made public by the engineer, it is understood the estimated cost of the railroad and equipment is in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

The proposed railroad will be about 30 miles in length and will tap one of the richest timber belts in Southern Oregon. In the event a satisfactory bid is received, actual work on the road probably will begin by August 15.
