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HERMISTON PEOPLE SHOW SORROW OVER MOTHER AND CHILD

FUNERAL OF FIRE VICTIMS IS LARGEST EVER HELD IN PROJECT CITY.

Mrs. Boone and Little Child Are Laid to Rest Following Impressive Services Yesterday Morning. Casket Covered With Flowers; Were Well Loved in Hermiston.

HERMISTON, Ore., July 13.—The funeral services for Mrs. Peyton T. Boone and baby daughter Grace, who were burned to death Sunday evening by gasoline at their home two and a half miles west of this city, were held yesterday morning at 10:20 from the Methodist church. Rev. T. A. Graham officiating. This was the largest funeral ever held in Hermiston, the Boones being pioneer residents of the project. The caskets were literally mounds of flowers, and the pulpit and choir lost also being beautiful masses of them.

The pallbearers were A. L. Larson, Thomas Fraser, Ralph Allen, Don Campbell and George Ransier; C. M. Jackson, E. L. Jackson, C. S. McNaught and Dr. J. A. Campbell.

Mrs. Boone was Grace Kent before her marriage to Mr. Boone nine years ago. She was born in Minnesota, September 30th, 1886, being 29 years, 10 months, and 21 days old at the time of her death. She came here with her husband eight years ago from Havre, Mont., where Mr. Boone was engaged in the drug business and located on their farm where they have since resided. Besides her husband, she leaves a daughter, Virginia, aged eight years, and a little son, Peyton Jr., aged four years, to mourn her loss. The baby, Grace, would have been two years old October 20th. Their bodies were laid to rest in the Hermiston cemetery.

SPRUCE BRINGS \$1,500,000.

Entente Allies Buy 20,000,000 Feet in Northwest for Aeroplanes.

SEATTLE, July 12.—The entente allies have in the past year paid \$1,500,000 for Oregon and Washington spruce to be used in the manufacture of war aeroplanes, according to Associated Secretary Robert H. Allen, of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association. Twenty million feet of spruce has been shipped overland to New York, Boston and New Orleans, and by steamship direct from Puget Sound. It was necessary to log six to ten times as much spruce as the total shipment.

The pieces used were 60 to 70 feet long without a blemish.

PLAN PROPOSED FOR WARMING WATER IN LOCAL NATATORIUM

OLD RESERVOIR WILL BE CONNECTED UP WITH OVERFLOW PIPE AT ONCE.

Sun's Rays Will Heat Water Before It Reaches Swimming Tank; Revenue From Pool Believed Sufficient to Meet All Expenses; Bids for Pipes to Be Asked.

At the meeting of the council last evening the natatorium committee was authorized to connect the old reservoir with the overflow pipe line so that it may be used as a warming tank for the natatorium. Lying open to the sun the water will be warmed considerably before being turned into the natatorium.

When Chairman Murphy of the finance committee demurred at incurring this additional expense, Councilman Phelps, who is on the natatorium committee, made the proposition that he would take a five year lease on the natatorium, put in a heating plant, pay the city ten per cent on the investment and at the end of five years turn the whole back to the city free of encumbrance.

He made this proposition simply as a token of his faith in the ability of the committee to make the natatorium pay for all the expenses of upkeep and improvement, providing warmer water could be secured. The committee simply asked that the city guarantee the money necessary to connect the old reservoir, declaring that before Sept. 1 the revenue from the swimming pool would be sufficient to pay all expenses.

The result was that the city recorder was instructed to advertise for bids for 250 feet of 19 inch terra cotta pipe. This will necessitate a delay of ten days or two weeks. However, the city attorney advised that there was no way of securing the pipe under the charter except by advertising for bids.

The old reservoir will hold enough water to give the natatorium three fillings. Thus there will always, in the hot months, be an ample supply of temperate water. At the present time when the water is first turned in it is so cold that few people will go into it. By the third day it has attained the right temperature and at the end of three days must be turned out for fresh water. The committee believes their plan of having a reserve supply of warm water will double the revenue from the institution.

Already this year the committee has had to spend several hundred dollars for repairs and improvements.

British Trawlers Sink.
BERLIN, July 12.—According to a statement given out by the Overseas News Agency German warships between July 4 and 6 sank 3 trawlers near the English coast. "German sea forces from July 4 to 6," the news agency says, "sank near the English coast the trawlers Queen Bee, Ann Anderson, Deep o' Day, Watchful, Nancy Human, Petrus, Carabosse and Newark Castle. Of these, the Queen Bee, Watchful and Petrus were shelled with artillery because they attempted to escape after being warned."

FIGHT OVER SHEEP PASTURE IS FATAL

BAKER, Ore., July 13.—Lawrence K. Eggers, homesteader, was shot and instantly killed by Clyde Hopkins, a sheepman, near Eggers' home, five miles south of Dundee.

Hopkins had his camp tenders drive him to Durkee, where he gave himself up. He is now in the county jail here.

Deputy Sheriff Nelson and District Attorney Godwin reached Durkee shortly after Hopkins. Coroner West decided no inquest necessary.

Eggers leaves a wife and three children. He was 32 years old. Hopkins is 34. He was in charge of sheep for about 10 years.

According to Hopkins' story, he was charged by Eggers with trespassing with the sheep on Eggers' land. He claimed Eggers' sheep had been approaching, took him by the arm, attempting to beat him.

Hopkins says he ran to his tent and secured a rifle, intending to shoot over Eggers' head. He says the gun went off before he intended as he raised it.

The bullet hit Eggers in the body. He died almost instantly. Eggers recently proved up on his homestead. He was industrious and well thought of.

A camp tender was nearby at the time of the shooting, but it is not known whether he actually witnessed the killing.

Secretary of War Newton D. Baker is said to have indicated that he will tender a Major-General's commission to Colonel Roosevelt.

Road Worker Is Killed.
BANDON, Ore., July 12.—Arthur Kyger, of this city, was instantly killed by the premature explosion of a charge of giant powder which he was placing under a stump while working with a road-building crew about seven miles south of this city. The cause of the explosion is unknown and other members of the crew say that the first they knew of the accident was when they heard the report and saw Kyger's body thrown into the air. The remains were brought to Bandon for burial.

Kyger was about 38 years old and had been living at the home of his foster mother, Mrs. E. C. Smith, of this city. He was unmarried and had lived in Bandon most of his life.

Well-Known Alaskan Is Sidelined.
JUNEAU, Alaska, July 12.—John Goodall, deputy United States marshal at Sitka and widely known throughout Alaska committed suicide at Sitka by shooting. He was formerly United States Commissioner at Cordova.
