DEMOCRATS FOR IOWA DRY.

State Convention Goes on Record for Prohibition Throughout State.

DES MOINES, Ia., July 13.—Iowa democrats in convention assembled for the first time in the memory of any of the leaders present, went on record in the state platform as favoring prohibition. The report of the resolutions committee adopted by the convention adopted the views of E. T. Meredith, gubernatorial candidate and went on record in favor of the resubmission to the people of the constitutional amendment providing for statewide prohibition. The platform endorsed the Wilson administration.

GERMANS HOLD CANADIANS.

Jail Sentences Given for Refusal to Make Munitions.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 13.—Canadian prisoners in Germany were sentenced to a year in jail by the Germans for refusing to make war munitions, according to a letter received here from Corporal Daniel A. Simmons, formerly a prisoner in Germany and now transferred to the internment camp in Switzerland.

Corporal Simmons writes that Corporal Harry Housart is one of those who refused to make munitions.

MRS. CHAMBERLAIN TO WED.

Engagement of American Widow of British Statesman Announced.

LONDON, July 13.—The engagement is announced of Mrs. Joseph Chamberlain, widow of the late British statesman, and the Rev. William Hartley Carnegie, rector of St. Margaret, and canon of Westminster.

Before her marriage Mrs. Chamberlain was Miss Mary Endicott, of Massachusetts, daughter of the late William Endicott, secretary of war in President Cleveland's cabinet.

Prisoners Made to Work.

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 12.—Acting on an order issued by the county sheriff Quine put the inmates of the county jail to work on the highways. Hereafter, according to the court, all men confined in the Douglas county jail charged with petty crimes must earn their keep by working on the roads.

Prisoners who refuse to work under the new order will have their diet reduced to bread and water.

52 Years Separate Visits.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 12.—After a lapse of 52 years, Franz Nidder of Portland, Ore., arrived here to find the spot from which he was chased by hostile Indians on his former visit now occupied by a thriving, modern city of 120,000 people.
