ALL OREGON CROPS IN PRIME CONDITION

Following is a summary of the crop
conditions in Oregon for the week
ending July 13, 1916, as reported to
the Portland office of the weather
bureau by special correspondents
throughout the state:

Ideal weather prevailed during the
week for the growing crops, which all
made splendid advancement. Fall
wheat is filling nicely, and the pros-
pects for a good crop are much better
than anticipated a few weeks ago.
Barley is ripening well, and in some
places it will be ready to harvest
within a week or two. Spring wheat
and rye have also made excel-
lent growth. Corn has improved
greatly, but this crop is still very
backward.

The second crop of alfalfa is being
harvested, and it is better than the
first one. It is also being secured
under more favorable conditions.
Wheat and rye hay are being cut in
the eastern counties, and timothy and
clover are being harvested in the
western portion of the state. Ranges
are excellent and stock is in fine con-
dition. The potato crop has made
splendid advancement during the
week and also has good prospects.

The cherry season is drawing to a
close and early peaches, loganberries,
raspberries and blackberries are now
ripe and being marketed.

LIVESTOCK IS FIRM IN PORTLAND YARDS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 12.—There
were no important changes in live-
stock prices at the North Portland
stockyards Wednesday morning, horses
remaining at the rate of a few days
ago, \$8.50 per 100 pounds, and lambs
\$8.25. Except in sheep the run was
considerably less than a year ago, but
this is accounted for by the late har-
vesting season. In 1915 that crop was
mostly in barns, silos or stacks at this
time, but now farmers are actually
"making hay while the sun shines,"
and have little time for marketing,
even with the temptation of present
high prices for swine.

CHERRIES NOT MUCH DAMAGED IS CLAIM

WHITE SALMON, Wash., July 12.—
Many tons of cherries are being
picked and sold to the local canners.
The rains which threatened to harm
the fruit did little damage here, only
a few cherries being split. Many
shipments of fancy picked are being
sent to the coast cities and Montana
and Idaho.

FORCES TO BE COMBINED.

Two Cannery Plants in Curry Now
Owned by One Company.
RANCHO, Ore., July 12.—Roderick
L. Macleay, manager of the Wedder-
burn Trading Company, which a few
months ago purchased the Fisher-
man's Co-operative Cannery, on the
lower Conville river, announces that
forces of the local plant and the com-
pany's cannery at Wedderburn, on
Bogue river, are to be combined. This
is made possible by the fact that the
salmon do not commence to run here
until after the season is over on the
Togue.

Improvements and additions to the
local plant are being made in prepa-
ration for the fall season.

PERPLEXING FACTORS DISTRACT TRADERS ON NEW YORK EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, July 12.—A well dis-
tributed trade featured the exchange
opening. First hour sales amounted
to 236,300 shares, with speculative
attention evenly divided. There was
considerable early short covering on
rumors of a concerted upward move-
ment in Baldwin and Crumley.

There were many perplexing fac-
tors operating in the market. Call
money rates undoubtedly threw the
trade in a mood of uncertainty. It
was reported, however, that internal
money was coming in large sums to
relieve the strain brought about by
the new extensive loan program.

Rail stocks, as a class, were duller
in the first hour than for several days
and trading was comparatively nar-
row. Reading played around 96 1/2 and
Union Pacific was fairly active. Crum-
bley and Steel common were slightly
firmer and in good call. The metal
list was active and some ad-
vances were scored in the initial
trading. Anaconda and Butte were
the leaders and sold up.

The locomotive issues were firm in
the opening. Marine preferred and
Studebaker, heavy losers yesterday,
made appreciable efforts to launch a
recovery movement.

Mexican Petroleum was about sta-
tionary around 35.
