NEWS OF PENDLETON

Paroled from Prison.

Walter Gilman, who was serving a term in the penitentiary from this county on a charge of cattle stealing, has been paroled by Governor Withycombe and is back in Pendleton.

Looking For Location.

J. H. Hufstle of Lander, Wyoming, a stockman, is spending a few days in the city and will look about over the county with a view to investing in stock lands.

Racing Car Goes Through.

A big Hudson Super-Six racing automobile, which had been at the Spokane races, passed through Pendleton yesterday morning under its own power en route to Portland for the races there Sunday.

Takes Round-Up Position.

Bertrand S. Jerard, popular young newspaperman, has resigned his position on the Tribune and has accepted a position in the publicity department of the Round-Up for the next few months.

Impersonated Federal Veterinary.

On a charge of having impersonated a U. S. veterinary inspector for the purpose of defrauding, S. A. Towe was arrested this morning at Pilot Rock by U. S. Deputy Marshal Barry. He is wanted in the eastern Washington district upon a complaint sworn to by John Kuest.

To Prepare Exhibit.

Supt. E. L. Swartzlander of the Umatilla reservation, will go to Salem tomorrow to make preliminary preparations for a big Indian exhibit at the state fair this fall. The various reservations and the Chemawa Indian school will combine to prepare an instructive exhibit of Indian craftsmanship and industry and will have a separate building for it. Major Swartzlander will be in charge.

Helix's Natatorium Under Way.

Helix will have a natatorium second only to Pendleton's in the very near future, according to W. H. Morrison, who was in from that town yesterday. He says the pool will be 35 by 75 in dimensions and built of concrete. Farmers of the vicinity donated the teams and labor for the excavation and ample funds were subscribed to pay the full cost. Water will be pumped from a well which has been proved to have an abundant supply.

Columbia Highway Nearly Done.

Messrs. P. M. Scroggin and D. P. Beardorf and party of Portland passed through Pendleton this morning in their Studebaker touring car, en route to Lethbridge, Alberta, where they have large farming interests and will remain there until they harvest their crops. They report that the Columbia highway will be entirely completed within a few days. The road they traveled between Echo and here they report fairly good.

Think Pup Is Mad.

Hugh Roby, section foreman, at Horn Hollow, today brought down a pup which he thinks has the rabies. E. P. Averill, inspector of predatory animals, examined the dog and found that it had some symptoms of the disease. He will confine it and keep it under surveillance. The pup bit Mr. Roby's seven year old son and also a section hand. If it develops the pup was rabid, the two will be given the Pasteur treatment.

Alleges She Was Defrauded.

Alleging that she was swindled in a land trade by agents of the Maxwell Land & Irrigation Co., Margaret Brown of Seattle has brought suit against the company for \$5250 damages. She alleges she traded in 1912 some Seattle property for 35 acres of land in the west end of the county. The land was represented to her, she alleges to be level, easy to cultivate,

She alleges it was not worth more than \$25 an acre and that the government had water charges of \$500 against it. Held for Revolving Crime.

Frank Williams, who was confined in the city jail for a minor offense for several days, is now in the county jail facing a charge of sodomy. Another former prisoner of the city is also being hunted on a similar charge.

Building Helix Natatorium.

L. E. Twitchell of this city, has the contract for the concrete work on the natatorium being built at Helix and is now engaged upon the job. The natatorium is to be 30 by 75 feet in dimensions and from four to eight feet in depth. The concrete work will cost \$400.

Cooler Day Enjoyed.

Today is cooler by several degrees than Tuesday and Wednesday, the temperature having reached only 99 at 2:30 this afternoon. The thunderstorm of last evening cooled off the atmosphere and made the night much more pleasant than its immediate predecessor.

Is in Tentative Regiment.

Captain Fleck of Spokane, who is devoting some time while here toward interesting former foreign service men in a prospective volunteer regiment proposed in Washington, has a commission promised him in that regiment should it be formed. He is not commissioned as a recruiting officer by the government. John Graham of Spokane, is the prospective colonel of the Washington regiment and the plan is to have the regiment made up entirely of former foreign service men.

LIGHTS OLD GLORY.

Schmectady resident devises New Way to illuminate flags on Private Residences.

Perhaps the first instance of the nightly illumination of an American flag on a private residence is to be found at the home of Col. C. E. Pruyn, 22 Bedford Road, Schmectady, N. Y. The apparatus used is very simple and inexpensive. The flag measures five by eight feet, and is suspended in front of the house from a short staff projecting from an attic window. On the roof of the piazza below are mounted two 60-watt Mazda lamps in Holophane reflectors. These lamps are hidden from the street and the light rays are directed upon the flag from both sides at an angle of about forty-five degrees. Current is taken from an ordinary lamp socket in one of the nearby bedrooms.

The effect is very beautiful, every detail of the flag standing out in vivid contrast with the surrounding darkness. The colors are strongly emphasized by the artificial light, and the flag, fluttering in the night air, is even more beautiful than by day. "The possibilities of this installation," explained its originator, "are not restricted to lighting the flag. The reflectors can be used to illuminate a tennis court, a croquet ground, or can be pressed into service for spectacular lighting at unusual festivities such as a lawn party."

ONE INDICTED AFTER RIOT.

Thirteen True Bills Are Returned by Marion Grand Jury.

SALEM, Ore., July 13.—Thirteen true bills and two not true bills were returned Saturday by the Marion county grand jury in session here. Of the 13 indictments, seven were secret. True bills were returned as follows: 1. Jeanne, assault with a dangerous weapon on J. Kelly at Turner, April 1, 1910; Louis Reed, charged with taking an automobile belonging to Felix Isaacson. Kenneth Day and Loryl Day, charged with breaking and entering with intent to steal. Oliver Lesley, charged with attacking and beating Nora Lesley, Frank Marshall, charged with a statutory offense, and C. Canfield, charged with perjury in obtaining alcohol at a Salem drug store.

BRITAIN MAKES CHANGES.
