FIRST SPECIAL OF PYTHIAN DELEGATES TO ARRIVE JULY 30

PORTLAND IS PREPARING TO PLAY HOST TO VISITING LODGE MEMBERS.

Convention of the Supreme Lodge Will Open on August 1 and Adjourn on August 10; Tremendous Crowd is Expected to be in Attendance During the 10 Days.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 14.—The first Pythian special train bearing delegates to the meeting of the Supreme Lodge of the order will arrive in Portland on Sunday, July 30. The first convention of the supreme lodge will open Tuesday, August 1. It will finally adjourn August 10.

The train bearing Pythian Sisters from their National Headquarters at Indianapolis will reach Portland on the same day. The convention of the Supreme Temple also opens on Tuesday. Between the arrival of the train and the falling of the gavel in the hands of Cora M. Davis of Union, Oregon, supreme chief, a great many social events are scheduled.

Monday afternoon the women of the supreme Temple will hold a memorial service, which will be followed by a report from a committee which has been gathering and writing the early history of the order. The report will be accompanied by a museum of relics of the early days and is expected to be a feature of splendid interest. Monday night the officers and members of the Supreme Temple will hold a reception in the Red Room of the Imperial Hotel for Pythians, "Camp followers" as the husbands of delegates to the Supreme Temple are called, will be allowed to attend.

Hotel reservations and correspondence warrants the assertion that a tremendous crowd will attend the meeting of the Supreme Lodge and the Supreme Temple.

It is expected that every city in the state will send big delegations of Pythians to participate in the program for the 10 days of their stay.

The big parade will occur on the afternoon of Tuesday, August 1, when every lodge in Oregon and Washington is expected to be represented. It will cover a route 45 blocks in length. Autos will be provided for the use of aged and infirm members, as well as for delegates to the two supreme law making bodies of the order. They will probably not come to the northwest again within the lives of men and women of today and the appeal is being made to the loyalty of every Pythian to register at headquarters and participate in the work.

The grand lodge of Oregon is to be in session for two days during this time.

Arrangements are being completed for camping the Uniformed Rank companies at Vancouver, Washington. All Oregon companies will join the Washington companies. A prize drill at Multnomah field is one of the features for Thursday. Strong rivalry is being developed between the companies of the two states as to which has the crack drill team. The prizes aggregate \$500 and will be paid in cash.

A feature of the entertainment that is bringing hundreds of visitors along with the delegates is the big clam barbecue on the beach at Seaside, scheduled for Saturday, August 6. The Eastern and middle Western delegates are keen for this event. Afterward there will be a swim in the Pacific and a dance in bathing costumes on the hard sand of the beach.

Another big feature is to be the trip over the Columbia River Highway and the salmon dinner at Bonneville.

BRITISH SHORT OF LABOR.

Munitions Trades Feel Lack of Men. Wages Raised for Thousands.

LONDON, July 13.—Employment throughout the United Kingdom continues at a very high level in all industries directly affected by the war, says the Board of Trade Labor Gazette.

During May 370,000 working people received increased wages amounting to 21,000 pounds per week, 400,000 miners, women operatives and engineers being chiefly affected.

Labor shortage continues most acute in munition trades, including engineering, shipbuilding and chemical industries. Coal miners and textile workers are also badly wanted in many districts.

Heat Prostrates Many.

BALTIMORE, July 13.—Three of the 22,000 in the Elk convention parade and 17 persons along the line were prostrated by heat. One boy died.

JUDGE BENNETT OF THE DALLES TO BE URGED FOR BENCH

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Senators Chamberlain and Lane of Oregon will at the earliest opportunity, recommend to the president the appointment of A. S. Bennett of The Dalles, Ore., for the supreme bench to succeed Charles E. Hughes. The senators believe no one yet has been decided upon for the vacancy, and they will urge Bennett as a capable jurist whose appointment would compliment the Pacific coast and its democracy.

ALLEGES WIFE DRINKS, SMOKES AND SWEARS

EUGENE, Ore., July 13.—Alleging that his wife, Stella G. Gullion, smokes cigarettes to excess, drinks and uses bad language, Dr. W. T. Gullion, member of the firm of Gullion & Gullion, local medical specialists and owners of the Northwest hospital, has sued her for a divorce. They were married in Marion county, Ind., April 16, 1899 and have one child, Guy, aged 10 years.

Immediately after filing of the complaint Mrs. Gullion filed an answer and cross complaint, alleging that her husband deserted her, although it is admitted that they live in the same house, but not as man and wife. Mrs. Gullion asks for the care and custody of the child, \$250 suit money, \$75 a month temporary alimony and \$100 permanent alimony.

SPURNED ADMIRER KILLS.

Chorus Girl's Rejected Suitor Shoots Her in Midst of Theater Crowd.

CAMDEN, N. Y., July 13.—Ella Dunbar, working as a chorus girl, was shot and instantly killed in the presence of a crowd of theatergoers at Ninth and Market streets by William Ashbridge, a former admirer. At the time of the shooting the woman was accompanied by her seven-year-old daughter, and the screams of the child when she saw her mother fall mingled with pistol shots, attracted the attention of the police, who arrested the man before he could make his escape.

A passing jinx took the woman to the Cooper hospital, but she was dead before the institution was reached. The police at the same time took Ashbridge to the hospital for purposes of identification and led him to the room where the body lay. As they were about to take him out, Ashbridge said: "Just a minute; let me kiss her," and threw himself on the body crying, "Good by Ella."

Mrs. Dunbar was a divorcee and was about to escape the attentions of Ashbridge.

Ashbridge fired five shots into the body of the woman, three entering her head and two her heart.

SCHOOLBOYS ARE DRILLED.

Army Officers Instruct Thousands in New York Training Camps.

NEW YORK, July 13.—Five hundred public schoolboys from this city, New Jersey and Pennsylvania, mobilized at Fort Hamilton for military maneuvers, are training under the direction of the National School Camp Association. The boys are from 9 to 17 years old. They will remain in training from two weeks to two months, as they or their parents decide. As far as possible, they will receive instruction similar to that given to army recruits. Army officers will deliver lectures and there will be daily drills.

It is estimated that 6000 young men and boys will be in training in various military camps in New York. One of these camps, located at Fort Terry, Plum Island, will be attended by 1200 youths.

GUARD TO ADD UNITS.

SEATTLE, July 13.—Under instructions from the war department, Adjutant-General Maurice Thompson, of the Washington national guard, authorized the immediate formation of eight additional units of the guard. The new organizations will be mustered into the federal service at once.

The immediate purpose of increasing the number of guardsmen, General Thompson said, is to bring the militia as near as possible to the quota it is expected to furnish to the 15th tactical division of the federal mobile army.

The raising of this additional force will add approximately 775 men to the state's mobile troops and will bring the total up to approximately 3000.

One field battery, one company of engineers and one field hospital corps will be recruited in Seattle. Two other artillery organizations will be formed at Spokane and Walla Walla. The second company of engineers will be organized at Spokane, as well the ambulance company. The extra troop of cavalry will be recruited at Ellensburg.

ACTION OF ENGLAND OVER DECLARATION HELD TO BE LEGAL

MINISTER OF BLOCKADE OUTLINES VIEWPOINT OF THE BRITISH EMPIRE.

Declaration of London Simply a Code Endeavoring to Reconcile Certain Contradictory Theories in International Law, Cecil Tells the United Press.

LONDON, July 14.—England acted strictly upon legal principles in abandoning the declaration of London, Lord Robert Cecil, minister of blockade, told the United Press. He answered several assertions made by the German chancellor recently regarding the declaration.

"Apparently the chancellor regards the declaration of London as a charter for freedom of the seas. The declaration of London merely was a code endeavoring to reconcile certain contradictory theories in international law. Specifically it permitted the destruction of neutral prizes. It did not repeal the right of belligerents against enemy commerce."

"The chancellor has accused England of lack of faith in not accepting the declaration. Apparently he has forgotten that the United States two years ago recognized that the declaration was not binding without an express agreement between the belligerents." The declaration had had no force at all since it was not ratified. It is very different from a treaty guaranteeing the neutrality of Belgium, which was absolutely binding upon the signatories and which Germany notoriously violated the moment that war was started, following this act by waging land and sea warfare with methods both contrary to international law and repugnant to ideas of civilization and humanity. We need not remind you of the amount of neutral shipping and the number of neutral lives destroyed."

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 14.—Speed 'em-up days, July 22 and 23, for La Grande, promise to be rich in their entertainment features. Besides the motor races, aeroplane flights, etc., there will be a great industrial parade for which the business men of La Grande are making elaborate preparations, and handsome prizes will be offered. A moving picture man will be on hand to reel the features. Automobiles decorated in every conceivable design are promised. Business men of La Grande are not given any special privilege in this as all car owners and drivers of the county are invited to participate.

CHURCH IS DISCUSSED.

"It Is Most Wasteful Institution That Exists," Says Educator.

MISSOURI, Mont., July 13.—"The church is the most wasteful institution that exists," is the statement of Dr. A. W. Taylor, head of the department of sociology in the University of Missouri, who lectured here recently to the students of the summer school of the University of Montana. Dr. Taylor's talk was an argument for united and co-operative action of the art and Christian organizations.

"The church is inefficient," said Dr. Taylor, "because of competitive interests. If we would, we could all belong to the same church, think as we saw fit, and be effective. Yet there is not enough in the things in which we disagree to save a single soul. Put the church to the test and you will find that we have so many churches that it is hard for us to be Christians."
