GARRISON AT OJINAGA REPORT-ED TO BE DISLOYAL TO DE FACTO CHIEF.

This information, it is understood, caused Funston to reinforce the troops at Big Bend, following reports that the presence of the Villistas would provide the Carranza army an opportunity to join the bandits leaving the border unprotected from the Mexican side.

FARMERS TO TALK BONDS.

Road Improvements to Be Issue in Wasco This Fall.

DUFUR, Ore., July 14.—The proposed county road bond issue will be considered by the Wasco County Farmers' Education and Cooperative Union at an open meeting to be held in this city.

The matter of voting bonds for permanent highway in Wasco county has been under discussion for several months, but only recently petitions were circulated, requesting the county court to submit the matter to the voters. The bond election will be held this fall.

It is expected that if the voters approve of the bond issue the money will be expended on the Columbia Highway from Mosier to Fairbanks, and on The Dalles-California Highway from The Dalles through Dufur, Tygh Valley, Mapin and on south to the Jefferson county line.

Fishing Improves at Astoria.

ASTORIA, Ore., July 14.—There has been a decided improvement in the run of salmon during the past few days and it began to look as though the real fishing season is about to commence. The catch was fairly good, particularly by the millmen at the mouth of the river and the trollers, who go outside. Several of the latter came in last evening with as high as six pounds of fine chinooks to the boat.

FRUIT MARKETING PLAN PROPOSED FOR OREGON

METHOD DEVELOPED FOR NORTH-WESTERN GROWERS MAY BE PUT IN EFFECT.

PORTLAND, Ore. July 13.—The weekly news letter of the United States department of agriculture relates that a plan for the efficient marketing of fruit in the northwest has been worked out by the office of market and rural organization which, it is believed, may offer suggestions for the solution of somewhat similar problems with other perishable crops or other sections of the country. This marketing plan is based upon a uniform contract, which must be made a part of selling contracts between the growers and their respective agents. The agents in turn are required to cooperate in carrying on certain specific activities which are considered as essential to the prosperity of the fruit industry in the four states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. Despite the fact that the Pacific northwest has been regarded as the home of cooperation in the fruit business, need for improved marketing facilities has become apparent in recent years. In certain sections of the country where the principles of cooperation have not been extensively developed this need is even more acute.

The results of the plan will therefore be watched with much interest and should throw light upon the problem of efficient distribution of certain crops throughout the country.

In the past it is stated, at least 75 or 80 per cent of the apple growers in the four states named have signed contracts with resident selling agencies. The new plan requires that these contracts will contain certain uniform provisions which make it possible for the agents to cooperate with the growers in carrying on the activities which the growers have demanded from them for some time.

To enable them to do so, a fruit growers' agency has been formed. To become a member of this organization a selling agency must handle an average of not less than 100 cases of fruit because it was believed that an agency handling less than this could not conduct an efficient selling service. This fruit growers' agency is to be managed by a board of trustees, consisting of not less than 11 active members five of whom are to be fruit growers, five selling agencies, and the eleventh member selected at large. Active members pay an annual membership fee of \$10 and passive members a fee of \$5. It is desired, however, that the growers should be able to handle the business of the agency.

ever, that the growers who become members should represent whole communities and not individual interests, and that their membership dues should be paid by their respective communities. In this way it is believed that adequate representation in the agency will be secured to the growers.

The cooperation among the selling agents, which is the primary purpose of the plan, is designed to improve conditions by securing accurate information, by obtaining much needed improvement in transportation and storage facilities, by developing markets, by expending the foreign outlet, by eliminating consignments, by insuring upon better methods of preparing fruit for market and better business methods on the part of the growers, and by fostering in other ways a better spirit of cooperation among growers and selling agents.

The financing of the organization is to be based upon the tonnage handled by each of the selling agents, although there will be a small revenue from the membership dues.

Such a plan is not recommended for all sections of the country. In some regions, whose cooperative organizations of farmers have been well developed already, it appears to be the better part of wisdom to leave conditions undisturbed. The plan, however, offers possibilities of eliminating much unnecessary waste and its actual operation should throw light on a number of problems.

Galicia Graveyards 700

Thousands of Soldiers Buried on Scenes of Great Battles.

LONDON, July 13.—Under the caption, "More than 700 Graveyards," the Berliner Vorwarts recently published an article referring to the battlefields of Galicia and to the efforts being made by the Austrian authorities to bring some sort of order into the chaotic conditions prevailing in the military burying grounds scattered over the province.

The writer, according to a summary of the article printed by the London Daily Chronicle, estimates that between the town of Gorlice and the heights of Tarnobrzeg no fewer than 419 graveyards have been cleared of their unsightly surroundings, and says that wherever possible neutral beauties in the landscape have been utilized to lend dignity to the enormous cemeteries.

All along the Dunajec graveyards are thickly strewn over the countryside. TOKIO DENIES NAVY REPORT.

Department Asks for Five Capital Ships Within Seven Years.

TOKIO, July 13.—Dispatches to America saying that Japan has authorized the construction of four super-dreadnoughts are misleading. The navy has submitted to the finance department a program to be introduced in the Japanese Diet, involving the expenditure of about 250,000,000 yen in seven years. This program calls for the construction of three superdreadnoughts and two battle cruisers.

The reported program would fulfill the naval ambition by the creation of a first-line fleet of eight superdreadnoughts. Officials of the navy department declined today to discuss the program.

2 ADDED TO LIST OF LOST.

British Say They Have Proof Two German Dreadnoughts Sunk.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—An admiralty cablegram to the British embassy here says positive proof has been found that the two great dreadnoughts Kaiser and Kronprinz were sunk by torpedoes during the battle of Jutland, and that they now have been added to the official British list of German ships destroyed.

The Kaiser was of 24,700 tons displacement and carried 10 12-inch 50-caliber guns. The Kronprinz carried 10 12-inch 50-caliber guns. She displaced 25,575 tons.

3 MEN KILLED BY SQUALL.

Superstructure on New Building Collapses in Wind.

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 14.—Three laborers were killed and five seriously injured in the collapse of a superstructure surrounding a new building at the plant of Smet Steel & Company on the Niagara river road near here.

The structure went down in a sudden squall that swept over Niagara river and some of the workmen declared that the building was struck by lightning. Several men were reported missing early in the day, but all subsequently were located.

SCHOONER AND CREW LOST.

Vessel Is Found Bottom Up in Gulf After Hurricane.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—The schooner Carrye Strong of Thom-

son, Me., bound from Mobile for Matanzas, was wrecked in the hurricane of last week in the Gulf of Mexico and her crew is believed to have been lost.

Lieutenant Hotel of the Coast Guard cutter Tallapoosa, reported that he had found the schooner bottom up, about 250 miles west of Key West. The derelict was destroyed.

13 ENLIST AT THE DALLES.

Lieutenant Ed Lemson Recruiting Company Quickly.

THE DALLES, Ore., July 13.—The proposed company of national guards that is being raised here by Lieutenant Edward Lemson now has 13 recruits.

Lieutenant Lemson says he is opposed to spectacular methods of recruiting, and would rather have his men enlist quietly.
