## SHOWERS PREDICTED FOR PACIFIC COAST FOR FIRST OF WEEK

TEMPERATURES TO AVERAGE BELOW NORMAL, FOLLOWED BY FAIR WEATHER.

WASHINGTON, July 17.—Pacific states: Temperatures will average below the seasonal normal with fair weather over southern portion and local showers at the beginning of the week, followed by fair weather over the northern portion of this district. Rocky mountain and plateau regions: During the week temperatures will average near or below the seasonal normal with local thunder-showers the first half and probably fair weather the latter half of the week. ### Spud Large; Many in Hill.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., July 17.—The record yield of early potatoes in the Hood River valley is held by E. P. Anderson. From a single hill of American Wonder, which had not finished their growth, Mr. Anderson harvested 13 tubers, the largest of which weighed 15 ounces and the smallest six ounces.

Mr. Anderson plants only the eyes of the potatoes, feeding the body of a tuber for food. He is a farmer of the old school and makes his plantings strictly according to phases of the moon.

### Soldier's Food Scrutinized.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., July 17.—Half a million dollars will be spent by the quartermaster's department in the erection immediately of screened buildings to be used as kitchens and dining rooms for troops on the border.

Notification that the war department had authorized the expenditure was received at departmental headquarters.

### All Stockholders Bound.

ALBANY, Ore., July 17.—Judge William Galloway held that stockholders of a corporation who sign a note for money received and used by the corporation are acting as trustees for the corporation and that all other stockholders are bound with the ones that sign the note.

The decision was rendered in the case of Worth Huston and Dr. W. H. Davis vs. the First National Bank of Albany.

The court relieved Mr. Huston and Dr. Davis of the full payment of a note for \$40,000 with accrued interest from June 1, 1916, and spread the responsibility upon the stockholders interested at the time the note was drawn.

### Turkish Town Is Carried.

PETROGRAD, July 17.—Russian troops have captured the town of Halbur, in Turkish Armenia, by assault. This information was given in an official statement issued by the Russian war department.

Balbur is 65 miles northwest of Erzerum and about 60 miles south of the Black Sea port of Trebizond.

### Crime Clinic Projected.

NEW YORK, July 17.—A complete psychopathic clinic, the first of its kind in the United States, will be one of the innovations which Thomas Mott Osborne will introduce in Sing Sing prison following his reinstatement as warden there, he announced here. All prisoners will undergo a thorough mental examination, and the feeble-minded and mentally deficient will be separated from the normal group.

Dr. Bernard Glueck, a specialist on mental diseases, will be installed at the prison as a resident psychiatrist, and will have assistants to carry on the work.

### Great Bridge Is Opened.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 17.—The new Harahan bridge spanning the Mississippi river at Memphis, said to be the longest structure on the river, was open to traffic. It cost 5,000,000.

Including approaches, the bridge is three miles long, the bridge proper being 2600 feet. Construction was started in June, 1912.

### British Rout the Turks.

LONDON, July 17.—Two columns of British troops operating on the eastern shore of the Gulf of Suez have routed 60 miles of difficult country held by the Turks, according to an announcement made by the secretary of the British war office. The statement says:
