VERDICT RETURNED BY THE JURY

WAUKESHA, Ill., July 17.—William H. Orpet, the University of Wisconsin student charged with murdering Marion Lambert, a high school girl and his former sweetheart, was found not guilty Saturday night by a jury in Judge Donnelly's court after five hours' deliberation.

The jury retired at 2:50 o'clock. At 6 o'clock its members were taken to dinner at a boarding house where they spent half an hour.

Fifty Await Verdict.

One hour later came the flash that a verdict had been reached. Probably fifty persons were still waiting for it. Orpet, who had taken his evening meal, was sent for in his cell. Judge Donnelly, a cripple who had been seated in a chair on the courthouse lawn chatting with the lawyers made his way painfully upstairs on a crutch.

The defendant, an abash, was seated between his mother and Mrs. Edwin Taylor, his landlady at Madison, when the jury filed in.

Woman in Black Makes Sound.

Only one sound broke the stillness with which for a few seconds the verdict was received. It came from a woman about 50 years old, dressed in black who had attended every session of the court. She made an inarticulate sound—something between a sob and a shriek.

She had never explained her interest in the case except to say that she was "a friend of humanity."

Orpet Feels Emotion.

Orpet was silent through excess of emotion. He was barely able to re-

main calm. The party then were taken home in an automobile by Leslie P. Hanna, Waukegan attorney for the defense.

Crowd Lines Route.

The usual Saturday night throng of farmers and their families in for the week end shopping and recreation was present in extra force and crowded the route which Orpet took after leaving the jail. He went first to the office of Leslie P. Hanna, his local attorney.

The Orpets had started for the suburban when intercepted and taken to the law office. Mr. Hanna sent for his automobile, however, and it was from this that Orpet had his first full breath of freedom after four months' incarceration.

The route lay partly along the shore of Lake Michigan, in which Orpet during his confinement expressed a wish to swim, past Helen's woods, in which place Marion came to her death, and the Orpet home on the McCormick estate.

Summer Romance Began.

Last summer, young Orpet, then a pallid, slender youth of 19, of sharply regular features somewhat vain of his college opportunities and undisciplined as to character, returned from the University of Wisconsin at Madison for a vacation at home.

He fell madly in love with Marion, according to his letters. She had completed her junior year at the Deerfield high school and was then 17 and known for her gaiety and laughter—"the life of the party," as

own parents, who expected him to remain faithful to college duties, they would accept the letters as conclusive evidence to the contrary.

The letter to Josephine was to corroborate that to Marion. Josephine testified that she never received it.

On the afternoon of the 5th, in a dark overcoat which he had borrowed to wear with a dress suit to a party which he expected to attend on the 12th, carrying the bottle of molasses and water in his pocket, and leaving behind him the alibi letters and a bed rumpled to deceive his landlady, the student proceeded by way of Milwaukee where he spent a half hour or so between trains to Lake Forest.

Arriving there he arranged by telephone to meet Marion on her way to school the next morning, walked about for a while to make certain his parents had retired and entered the McCormick garage, where he spent the night on a cot.

Took Walk in Woods.

In the morning he and Marion met and walked through the snow into the woods. Orpet testified that there was little conversation and he could recollect only the purport of it. He offered her the "medicine" and she refused it. He started to leave but she called him back and asked if he was going to write to her any more. He said there seemed to be no use of it, and started away again.

"Something made me look around—I don't know what—and I saw Marion lying in the snow," related the defendant on the stand. "I started, knelt over her for maybe a minute. I noticed the moist powder was red. Then a kind of fog came on my brain and I don't remember much after that except on reaching the road I threw away the 'medicine' and made my way on foot to Highland park, caught a train, and that evening arrived back at Madison."

Body Found Next Morning.

Marion was missed that night and her body found the next morning. Orpet was arrested and told numerous conflicting stories prior to the trial, these being used against him at the trial.

During his cross examination, which lasted three days, he repeatedly took refuge in "I don't remember." He spoke in a low voice, with apparently studied effort, but nevertheless became involved at times and contradicted himself by "correcting my previous testimony." His manner was nervous, and he rarely looked at his questioner, Attorney Joslyn.
