It is presumed that in twisting in a dive she wrenched some of the muscles of her back so that they became temporarily paralyzed. Three physicians with a pulmonologist worked for hours, but could not resuscitate her. Miss Anderson's home was in Dallas, Texas.

### TWO MISSIONARIES MURDERED IN JAPAN

TOKIO, July 18.—The brutal murder at Karube of Dr. Campbell, a Canadian missionary, and his wife has led more than 100 other American and Canadian missionaries residing there to demand permission from the authorities to carry arms for self defense.

The murderers of the Campbells have not been found. The murderers entered the Campbell home at 3 o'clock Saturday morning and stabbed them to death. They then looted the house of all the money they could find, about \$15.

He will spend his "vacation" in that work.

### DREADNAUGHTS VOTED DOWN

### PROPOSAL FOR FLEET IN PACIFIC MEETS WITH SENATE OPPOSITION.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—The senate voted 48 to 18 against Pacific coast senators' amendment to the general naval bill providing for three proposed dreadnaughts to be maintained permanently on the western coast. Works, Jones and Fishel emphatically supported the amendment. Swanson and Lodge insisted that the amendment infringed on the constitutional powers of the president as commander in chief of the navy. Coast speakers declared that there were no first class battleships on the Pacific, despite a possible Japanese danger. The senate adopted Wilson's naval program providing for eight capital ships this year and 16 within the three years. The passage of the whole bill appears to be at hand.


