## RECRUITING OFFICE IS OPENED TO GET MEN FOR REGIMENT

### ABLE-BODIED MEN BETWEEN AGES OF 18 AND 45 ARE IN DEMAND.

Captain Lee Clark is in charge of local office which will be maintained here several days. Oregon militia is 800 men short of regular strength.

Able-bodied men between the ages of 18 and 45 are wanted for border service. Captain Lee Clark, Oregon militia recruiting officer, arrived here yesterday for a three-day stop for the purpose of accepting recruits for the United States army.

The quota for the Oregon state militia is 800 men short of the required number and every effort is being made to bring the militia up to standard.

The following communication from Chief Musterling Officer Williams at Clackamas, Ore., has been received by Postmaster Tom Tweedy:

"Would advise that Captain Lee Clark Oregon militia recruiting officer will arrive in your city for three days for the purpose of accepting recruits for the Oregon national guard now on the border. Able-bodied men between the ages of 18 and 45 are wanted. Any person having relatives depending on them for support will not be accepted.

The wages of the soldier are from \$15 to \$45 per month. In addition to the pay, all clothing, rations and medical attendance are furnished free. I will thank you to give this information to the local press with a view to its circulation prior to the arrival of the recruiting officer mentioned above. I shall also thank you, if you will be so kind as to give the information to the local commercial club and also such public officials as may be able to increase its publicity.

The quota for the state of Oregon is 800 men short of the required number it should furnish in response to the call of the president of the United States of June 15, 1916."

### DRY ROT PEACH IS SERIOUS MENACE TO WILLAMETTE VALLEY

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21.—Dry rot peaches are again coming forward from various Willamette valley districts, causing not only much worry and loss to handlers, both wholesale and retail, but inflicting serious loss to producers.

This dry rot struck Willamette valley peach orchards quite heavily several years ago and the disease has become so serious that many handlers do not care to purchase the supplies at any price.

Efforts have been made by various horticultural authorities and experts to eliminate the disease, but it seems to be gaining ground instead of dying out.

Shipments of Willamette valley peaches come forward in excellent condition. The stock now about as fine color, flavor and appearance as any ever received here. Within 24

hours the dry rot appears and in another similar period the fruit is unfit for use.

Along the wholesale way sales of this stock are reported as low as 50c a box, but even at that price buyers claim the stock is high compared with keeping quality at 75c a box.

### HOGS AND SHEEP ARE FIRM AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21.—The strength of the hog and mutton market continues, but cattle remain weak for most offerings.

There was only a limited run of swine in the North Portland yards over night. These were picked up by buyers early in the day's session, \$9 continuing as the top for quality offerings.

### BARLEY DEMAND IS BETTER IN OREGON

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21.—Demand for wheat remains quite keen; in fact, the entire grain trade is showing an undercurrent of strength.

There is little disposition among growers to let go of their wheat at this time and those that have purchased at primary points of late have been forced to pay higher than the tide-water basis.

Barley market is perhaps the strongest of all despite the decline during the last 24 hours. There is an extremely good market in the south and the west is inquiring strongly for supplies at Pacific northwest sections.

Oats market is generally steady to strong, with little trading reported. Flour trade is quiet, but quotations are generally well maintained at \$5.20 for leading brands of patent.


Inquiries for grain bars are increasing with a corresponding increase in the strength of the market.
