DOUBLE MURDER CAUSES SENSATION IN CHILE

Buenos Aires, July 22.—A sensational double murder, involving persons figuring in exclusive Argentine and Chilean society circles, was reported in dispatches from Santiago, Chile.

Deputy Riesco, son of a former president of Chile and himself a member of the Chilean national congress, entered the Hotel Oddo and found

Miss Blanca Figueroa, beautiful daughter of the Chilean minister to Argentina, in the company of a well-dressed Argentine man, whose identity has not been established. He shot Miss Figueroa through the heart and killed her companion with two bullets through the brain.

Jealousy is supposed to have been the motive for the crime, though Riesco refused to answer questions.

COURT MARTIAL ORDER FOR TEXANS RECEIVED

SAN ANTONIO, July 24.—Perhaps no episode in the history of the United States army ever faded away so silently and died a quicker natural death than the courtmartial ordered for the recalcitrant Texas militiamen who refused to be mustered into the federal service for duty on the border.

The courtmartial simply "died a bornin'" and it has been impossible to get a lucid statement of what happened, or rather, did not happen, from any official at Fort Sam Houston, headquarters of the southern division.

At first 116 Texas state guards flatly refused to take the oath More than that, they declared they would stay at the concentration camp until the government or the state of Texas or somebody paid their railroad fare back home.

It was put up to the Texas national guard. Since the state body has been mustered into the regular army, the Texas officials said it was up to the regular army meaning Major General Frederick Finston. He passed it up to Secretary of War Baker, Secretary of War Baker passed it up to the war department. The president ordered a courtmartial. Major H. C. Winslow of the staff of the judge advocate general came all the way from Washington to handle the delicate situation. The government "had a bear by the tail."

"Oh, it will take some time to investigate all the circumstances and decide on the best plan of action," Major Winslow said vaguely when he first reached Fort Sam Houston.

There has been no courtmartial. The fact is that nearly all of the men who hung back have since come into the service. One by one they have drifted in and asked Major Winslow how they could go about getting to the border with their companies.

Those who have expressed such doubts have been sent on to their commands. But the charges against them have not been dropped.

That is the status of the courtmartial now. It is doubtful if the few holding out will be tried, and the department has not yet found out how to drop the charges against those who have come in.

"Oh, the matter will settle itself, I am sure," Major Winslow said, still vaguely.

WARM, CLOUDY WEATHER FORECAST FOR OREGON

WASHINGTON, July 24.—Pacific States: The weather will be warm and generally fair in California and partly overcast with normal temperatures in Oregon and Washington.

Rocky mountain and plateau regions: Temperatures will average near the seasonal normal with fair weather over the plateau region and scattered local thundershowers in the Rocky mountain region.

FORMER BAKER DOCTOR ARRESTED IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, July 24.—Charged with practicing medicine without a license and with unlawfully appealing to her name the letters "M. D.," Dr. Frances McCandless, formerly of Baker, a druggist's physician, was arrested last night on a complaint of Dr. Harry P. McKay, a member of the state board of medical examiners. After being in jail a couple of hours she was released on \$250 cash bail, put up by George O. Omer, manager of the Portland hotel, where she has her office.

The arrest followed the signing of a death certificate by Dr. McCandless in the case of Mary Obermeier of 328 Main street last Tuesday. Dr. McCandless said today she was induced against her will to sign the death certificate by Dr. F. H. Dammasch, county coroner, although she had never treated the patient nor even examined her before her death, while the woman up to a few hours before her death, she said, had been a patient of Dr. Dammasch.

TO SUCCEED JUDGE HUGHES



Judge John H. Clarke of the United States district court at Cleveland has been nominated by President Wilson for associate justice of the United States supreme court to succeed Associate Justice Charles E. Hughes.

In Cleveland Judge Clarke for a long time was associated in politics with the late Mayor Tom Johnson and Secretary of War Baker. He has been classed as a progressive democrat and has taken part in several reform movements.

UNKNOWN PROWLER IS MYSTIFYING MARSHFIELD

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 24.—Nightly visits to Marshfield homes by an unidentified prowler continue, despite the vigilance of scores of amateur sleuths. During the past two nights the homes of Muir Dano and Mrs. Rose McIntosh were entered, although the espionage has become general.

In each case the property in the house has been strewn promiscuously about the rooms. This corresponds to the actions of the marauder in all other visits. In a dozen or 15 raids nothing has been stolen so far as known, but in all cases the premises were left in a state of disorder.

Drawers, closets, trunks and bureau were rummaged and the contents scattered. The fact that robbery does not appear to be the motive has cast a considerable air of mystery over the depredations.

Nearly all the unexplained visitations were effected during the afternoon and early evening. The last raid made it appear that the prowler is fully aware of the precautions taken by householders and has little trouble selecting unguarded homes for his operations.

QUIZ IS HALTED BY JUDGE

Pending Indictment Against Husband Stops Questions.

PHILADELPHIA, July 22.—Judge Brown in domestic relations court stopped a cross-examination which aimed to reveal details of relations between William H. Armstrong, a real estate broker, and "some one" in a New York hotel last February.

Armstrong's wife, Anne, who lives at 223 South Forty-ninth street, petitioned the court for a support order from her husband. Armstrong pleaded that he couldn't pay the order.

Thomas J. Meagher, counsel for Mrs. Armstrong began to quiz the husband about some visits to gambling places, which Armstrong admitted. Meagher pursued the examination, and asked Armstrong about the New York episode.

William A. Gray, counsel for the husband interrupted with an objection, saying that Armstrong was under indictment for a statutory offense, and his testimony might incriminate him. Judge Brown stopped the cross-examination, and made an order on Armstrong of \$22.50 a week for his wife's support.

KAISER PENSIONERS OFFICERS

Five to Leave Army, Two to Take Commands at Home.

ROTTERDAM, July 22.—Emperor William has decided to pension seven prominent generals holding important commands in the Prussian army, according to the Berliner Tageblatt, a copy of which has been received here. All the generals have tendered their resignations.

Five of them, General von Bredow, General von Wientkowski, Generals Klokke, Cramer and Von Buer, will leave the army, while the other two, Generals von Kleist and Krahmer, have taken home commands.

MEAT PRICES ARE NO HIGHER, SAYS PACKER

CHICAGO, July 22.—Chicago packers furnished new proof that Uncle Sam's soldier boys are not only the best fed on the firing line but also at home. When the United States trooper marched away to do military duty he gets just as much meat to eat as he got at home—but no more.

This was the answer packers gave today when asked if any more meat was being consumed and if the price was any higher now than before the government ordered militia mobilization and began buying large quantities of meat.

"Why should meat prices be any higher? The American soldier gets just as much meat at home as he does in the army. The demand is no greater just because the government is buying meat in large quantities. The American soldier or civilian demands his meat and gets it," one Chicago packer said. "This is not true
