### Further Gains Made in Wheat

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—Chicago was excited for wheat during the early day's trading in the pit, and sharply higher prices and new high records for this movement were established.

Black rust reports are now more generally confirmed from leading centers and even the bearish element has at last realized that there is something more to the reports than "hot air."

Even European markets have at last discovered that there is something to the damage reports, and general quotations were advanced during the day. Cargoes were reported by English interests at an advance of 2 to 9d while Liverpool reported spot wheat 2d above Monday.

Locally there is much strength to the situation, with trading slowly increasing. Eastern interest continues in the market for red wheat, and some of the local milling interests are said to be getting interested at prevailing prices.

Course grains continue firm in the interior, with business not brisk.

Hay market continues firm for old stock, with the trade here still paying \$20.50 for a ton for east of the mountains timothy. Alfalfa is being offered by the interior at slightly lower prices, purchases being reported by wholesalers here at \$14 a ton. Practically no interest is shown at the moment in other new hays, although the trade expects to purchase No. 1 timothy around \$18 to \$20. Until it is ascertained the exact amount of damage by recent rains it will be impossible to tell exactly what the hay market will start around.

Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that the weather in the United Kingdom was cool and wet, with crops not favorable.

France—Harvesting in the south attended by cool and wet, and elsewhere it is dry, with weeds.

Italy—Harvesting with wetness; crop promises large, but of inferior quality.

Balkan states—Generally favorable.

India—Dryness with native food grains fair.

Argentina—Generally cold and dry.

Australia—Dryness over a wide area; crop outlook fair.

A hurricane with hail passed over central Europe on Monday, causing severe damage to all crops.

Extreme weakness is shown all through the market for cattle. While limited sales were made on the first day of the week at \$8 for extreme quality steers, even this price was not obtainable from regular buyers, and outsiders were resorted to in order to secure anything above \$7.89. The latter price was the best available from any of the regular buyers.

The steers that brought \$8 in the yards were just as good as the 1000 that brought \$8.25 a week ago; in fact were tip-top quality. For ordinary stuff the loss is even greater than this.

The position of the cow market is unusually depressed. It takes exceptional quality to bring better than \$5.25 for the moment. Some stock for which the trade has offered \$5.75 during the last 24 hours would have been readily picked up on the depressed market of a week ago at \$6.25.

The only shippers of livestock to enter North Oregon overnight were Rice Bros., who had a mixed load of cattle and hogs from Coos county.

Hog Market is firm.

Market for hogs continues to show strength at North Portland, with demand exceeding supplies of extreme quality at the moment. With big values still offering at eastern centers, and with a known shortage in holdings at Pacific northwest points, killers are forced to seek offerings at this time. It is, in other words, a seller's market.

### FOREST NOTES.

Coniferous timber has been found to be better suited than any other for the production of ethyl alcohol.

There are 592 consumers of timber in the United States who use annually 425,000 cords of hemlock bark, 239,000 cords of oak bark, and 300,000 cords of chestnut wood.

Experts of the forest service estimate that the farm woodlots of the United States contain from 200 to 300 billion board feet of lumber and from one to one and a half billion cords of wood.

On March 4, 1907, congress passed a law changing the name of "Forest Reserves" to "National Forest." The former name was considered a misnomer, as the government forests are not "reserves" in the generally accepted sense of the word; rather are they to be developed and used.

One hundred thirty thousand maps of the National Forests will be distributed to tourists this summer. These maps show the best camp sites, good hunting and fishing grounds, roads, trails and telephone lines, and give directions how to reach points of interest.

All of the 28 counties of Utah contain portions of National Forests and consequently all share in the 25 per cent of the National Forest receipts which is paid over to the road and school funds. This is true of no other state.

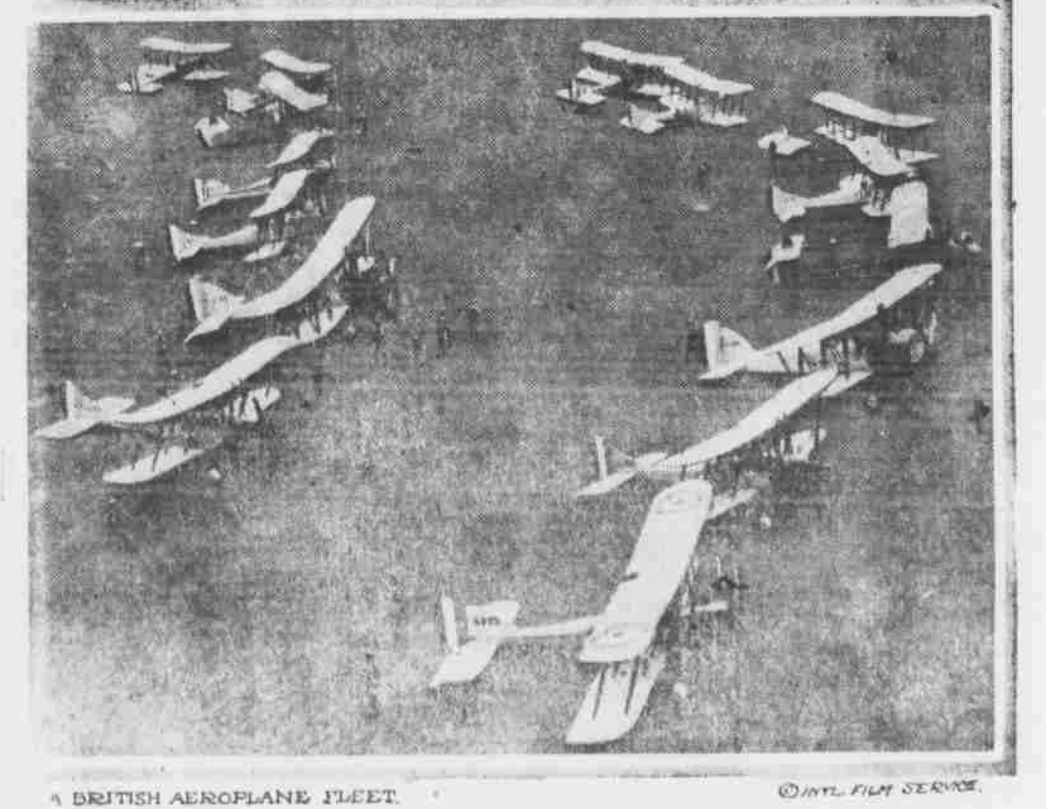
