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### BIG BEND COUNTRY PREPARED FOR RAID

COMMANDER OF U. S. FORCES DECLARES BORDER PATROL IS IN FINE CONDITION.

EL PASO, July 29.—"If there are any bandits planning raids on the Big Bend country, we hope they attack now," is the substance of a message here from Colonel Gaston, commander of the Big Bend district.  
Replying to a query whether he had sufficient troops, Gaston said the border patrol was made up of Sixth United States cavalry, fourth Texas infantry, a battalion of the Tenth Pennsylvania and a battalion of the States' Pennsylvania. For weeks reports have indicated Villamen in the vicinity of Boquillas planning a raid on American towns.

### BRANDENBURGERS ARE OUSTED FROM DELVILLE

GERMAN COUNTER-ATTACKS ARE BEATEN OFF WITH HEAVY LOSSES.

LONDON, July 29.—The Britishers have driven the Brandenburgers out of Delville wood, according to Haig's report today. One hundred and sixty three were captured. Two German counter-attacks were beaten off with heavy losses to the enemy.  
Near Neuve Chapelle small parties of Germans entered the front trenches but were immediately driven out, leaving their wounded.

### Transportation of Supplies is Being Rushed at Border

FIFTY TRUCK DRIVERS AND A TRAINLOAD OF NEW MOTOR-TRUCKS ARRIVE.

COLUMBUS, N. M., July 29.—Facilities for hauling supplies to the American expedition in Mexico are being increased today. Fifty truck drivers and a trainload of new motor-trucks were unloaded at the base camp here last night. The captains of ten motor trains are being withdrawn for duty in the quartermasters department. They are replaced by lieutenants from the Massachusetts and New Mexico militia.

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### HAND TO HAND BATTLE AT POZIERES CONTINUES FIERCELY

GERMANS INSIST BRITISH ATTACKS ARE BROKEN; SOME GAINS MADE.

(Ed L. Keen.)  
LONDON, July 29.—The same desperate hand to hand fighting by which the British captured Pozieres from the Germans is proceeding today on the outskirts of Longueval and beyond Delville woods northeast of that town. Haig reported his troops were successful.  
The Berlin communique insisted that fighting is still progressing and British attacks were broken. The British report that strong German counter attacks were directed toward the trenches newly won by Kitchen's troops had been beaten off with heavy loss to the enemy.  
Elsewhere artillery fire was reported. The Berlin statement confirmed this with additional information that north of the Somme the fighting had increased to the "highest strength." Both statements agreed that the patrol was engaging Britishers in the Neuve Chapelle district. The British admit a temporary German gain on the first line trenches, but asserted they were retaken. Berlin made no claim to occupying ground, but claimed body, men and guns.

### MAJORITY OF CASES DISMISSED

1914 COAL STRIKE INDICTMENTS WILL NOT BE TRIED BY COLORADO COURT.

DENVER, July 29.—Attorney General Farver of Colorado has announced that the majority of the 84 strikers' cases growing out of the 1914 coal strike will be dismissed. The supreme court appeals of Striker-leader John Lawson and others, who were given life terms after the conviction charges of participation in the fatal riot, will not be affected.

the speech was a breach of faith apparently made with the intention of wrecking the negotiations for a compromise.

In his speech before the house of lords on Tuesday Lord Lansdowne outlined a system for the provisional government of Ireland when martial law is abolished there and until a new government can be established. Among other suggestions made by Lord Lansdowne was the maintenance of a garrison in Ireland strong enough to preserve order. He thought 10,000 troops under command of General Maxwell would be sufficient to prevent the situation from getting out of hand.
