

### European Wheat Takes Big Jump

PORTLAND, Ore., July 28.—Further sharp advances were noted in the price of wheat at practically all leading world's centers during the early part of the day.

Foreign markets are at least seemingly aware of the great damage done the American crop, as well as elsewhere and values were boosted at both Liverpool and Buenos Aires.

Liverpool cash wheat showed an advance of 2 1/2 @ 3d for the day, really means 5 1/2c a bushel in American money. At Buenos Aires cash wheat was quoted unusually firm at 1 1/2 @ 1 3/4 a bushel advance over the previous day.

Speculation for wheat at Pacific northwest points is increasing there.

By confirming in full all previous forecasts made in The Journal that indicate would purchase heavily as soon as they realized the real situation. Quite fair business has been shown in the interior during the last few days, but a greater volume could have been moved providing holders were willing to let go.

Coarse grains are following wheat in showing strength at interior points and the price of flour is likewise firming up somewhat.

Troumhall cabled from Liverpool that Argentine dryness and the American drought has affected sentiment of the wheat trade. European crop prospects are not favorable as the weather and other conditions are against the best development of the plants.

Regarding the crop in the central west, John Ingalls wires from Devils Lake, N. D.: "Rust and heat blight is creeping rapidly from Missouri to Devils Lake. Rust extending northward; blight, estimate of yields valueless, as the crop is shrinking daily, both in quality and quantity. I consider the loss from blight the most serious. Farmers will commence cutting next week."

Limited arrivals were shown again all through the livestock market at North Portland. Over night there was a small run of hogs with some very good quality presented. General swine market trade conditions are steady around previous prices.

of the higher bidding has been done by outside interests.

Latest cables from England and Australia indicate that the trend of the trade there is most favorable with full prices realized. A special report from South America indicates a great decrease in the number of sheep available for shearing and naturally the output of wool there will be curtailed considerably. Much interest is shown by the world's trade in the South American situation.

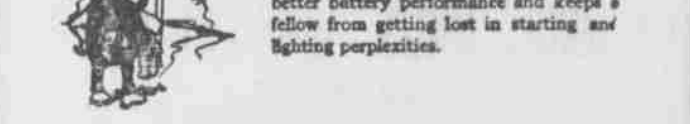

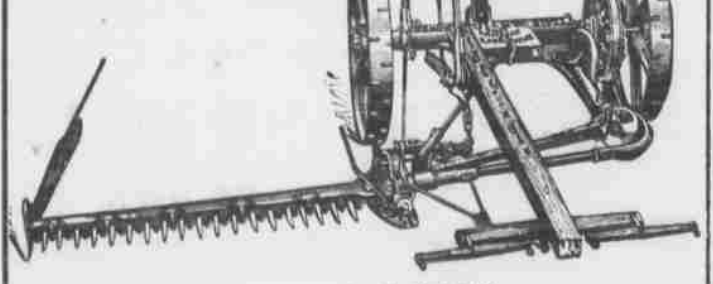
