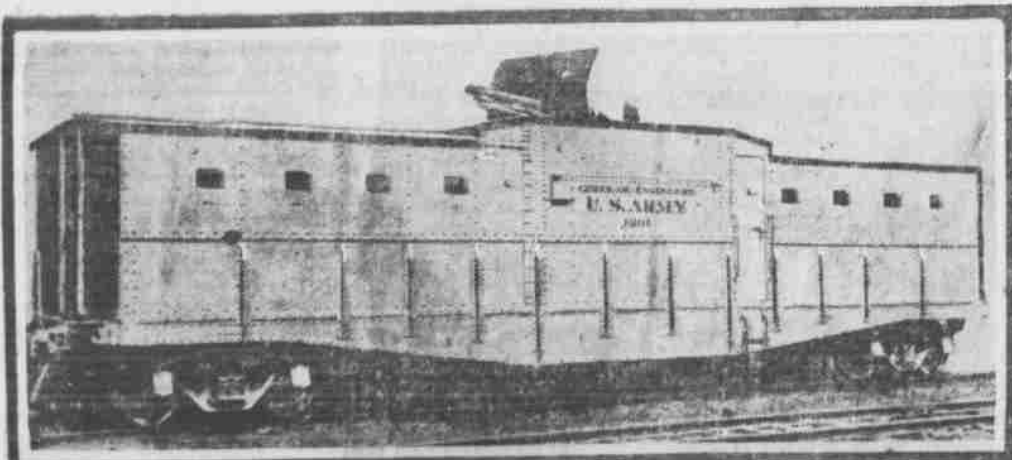

TWELVE ANGRY MEN DISARMED BY SHERIFF

Whitney Mill Workers Cannot Have Weapons Again Until They Leave Country.

BAKER, Ore., Aug. 11.—Twelve angry and threatening foreign lumber workers of the Hillgard Lumber Company, near Whitney, were lined up today by Deputy Sheriff Ray Preston, who took away from them 16 fire arms before they had time to resist or to compromise.

After the men were disarmed they

were discharged and three more also ordered to quit because of flagrant insubordination.

Now the men want their weapons back and Sheriff R. P. Anderson says they cannot have them until they leave this part of the country or until all trouble at the camp is over.

Many of the men assert they are American citizens and should have firearms, which range from automatics to huge caliber revolvers, but the sheriff is awaiting proof of this.

The trouble started when Foreman George Malkley discharged a logger and his companions tried to compel his retention.

TWO HUGE LOANS TO BE MADE TO ALLIES

Loan of From \$200,000,000 to \$250,000,000 to be Made to Great Britain.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Aug. 11.—Further huge American credits are being arranged to provide means to pay in this country for great additional purchases of munitions and other products of the United States which European nations are making.

There is to be a loan of from \$200,000,000 to \$250,000,000 to Great

Britain and another of \$50,000,000 to Russia. The prospective international financing already has passed the preliminary stages of negotiation. Various banking houses today had the matter broached to them in general terms by J. P. Morgan & Co.

HOUSEWIVES' LEAGUE WILL OPPOSE BAKERS

Ten Cent Leaves Will Meet Nation-wide Contest by 700,000 Members

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—A 10 cent standard for bread loaves will not be established without a nationwide fight by Mrs. Julian D. Heath and the 700,000 housewives who are members of the National Housewives' league of which she is president.

"The bakers have to prove they are losing money before we submit either to reduction on the wheat or raise in price," said Mrs. Heath.
