TANK CARS OFFERED FOR GOVERNMENT USE

Union Tank Line Company to Help Water Problem on Mexican Border.
NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—The Union Tank Line company, a former subsidiary of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey, has come to the aid of the war department in solving the problem of getting fresh water to the troops along the border.
It was learned today that the company had offered to the military authorities the use of 40 new tank cars, each with a capacity of 8000 gallons. The offer was accepted immediately and the cars will be on their way in a solid train from Milton, Pa., where they were built, to San Antonio. The offer entails use of the cars as long as the government needs them, and this despite the fact that oil refiners are reporting a shortage of 2000 to 3000 cars in equipment available for the transportation of petroleum.
