RIETH MAN SUFFERS BAD BURNS FROM A PECULIAR ACCIDENT

JAMES RIPPEE USES KEROSENE IN WATER FOR GREASY CLOTHES—FIRE RESULTS.

Freight Wreck Makes Much Additional Work for Men at Junction on Account of Bad Order Cars Being Brought Back for Repairs and Transfer.

RIETH, Aug. 14.—James Rippee, an employe at the round-house, was quite badly burned about the arms, legs and feet about 9 o'clock Sunday morning and his box car house caught on fire as a result of using kerosene in a tub of water in which he was washing some greasy over-clothes. In some manner the kerosene caught on fire and Mr. Rippee received his burns in getting the tub kicked out of doors. After the emergency dressings had been applied to the injured limbs, Mr. Jackson took him to Pendleton in his auto where he could have the attention of the company surgeon, Dr. Ringo.

The wreck which occurred eight miles west of here on the morning of the 10th has caused lots of extra work here on account of bad order cars being brought back here for repairs and some to be transferred. Four cars of coal were a total wreck and the clam shell from La Grande has been busy picking the coal up and loading it into other cars to be sent forward. Roy Duncan, formerly of this place, but now of La Grande, had charge of the locomotive crane engaged in picking this coal up.

Supt. W. Hollins, Assistant Superintendent A. Buckley, Division Master Mechanic all of La Grande, were here Friday in connection with the wreck and conducting the regular monthly supply train over the division.

PAPER SHORTAGE DUE TO WAR EXPERTS SAY
WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—In reply to a personal inquiry by President Wilson regarding the paper situation in the United States, Secretary of Agriculture Houston has written saying: "Our experts are inclined to believe that the present conditions may be temporary."

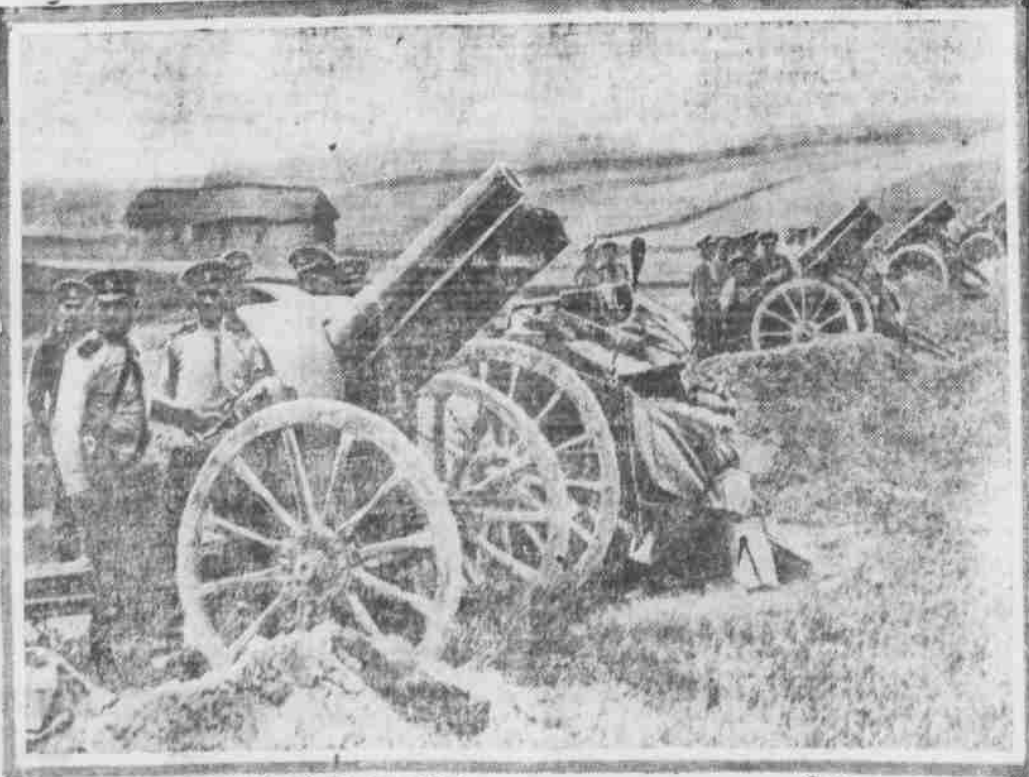
"I am informed that before the war eastern markets, which are the principal paper markets in the country were fully supplied by American mills and the imports from several foreign countries. Prices as a result were so low as to offer little inducement to new mills in the west where our great timber reserves are located. It is probable conditions after the war may be very similar to those which existed before. These factors have a direct bearing on the suggestion regarding the construction and operation of government plants."

OLDEST PIONEER OF BAKER VALLEY DIES Augustus George, Aged 96, Located in County in 1865.

BAKER, Aug. 14.—Augustus George, 96, believed to have been the oldest pioneer of Baker valley, died early Friday evening at his home near Haines. He was born in Kentucky, and came to Baker county in 1865, being the second man to take up land in the Powder river valley. He enjoyed excellent health up to eight days ago when he was stricken with paralysis. He leaves three sons and two daughters.
