PRESIDENT WILSON WILL DEDICATE \$10,000,000 DAM

200,000 Acres of Fertile Lands in Mexico and Texas are Reclaimed.

EL PASO, Texas, Aug. 15.—When President Wilson touches the golden key which will start the waters of the Rio Grande flowing through the spillways of the great Elephant Butte dam on October 14, he will "bring in" 200,000 acres of fertile lands in the chain of valleys in New Mexico, Texas and Old Mexico. The first meeting of the 23rd International Irrigation congress will be held at the dam dedication and followed by sessions in El Paso, Oct. 16, 17 and 18.

The Elephant Butte dam is a mass of concrete and steel thrown across the Rio Grande on the desert of New Mexico at the point where a great rock formed like the head and body of a mustadonic elephant, seems to drink from the Rio Grande. This giant impounding dam has formed the largest irrigation reservoir in the world. More than 45 miles in length and 8 miles across, the lake stores the

melted snows of the Colorado Mountains and these life-giving waters are allowed to flow through the spillways of the dam when the land needs moisture for the growing season, this course in the desert areas below the dam to blossom and bear fruitage.

"The dedication of the Elephant Butte dam by President Wilson on Oct. 14 will be an event of world-wide importance in the irrigation field," states James G. McNary, president of the First National Bank of El Paso and chairman of the Board of Control of the Irrigation Congress. "It will mark the reclamation service's greatest achievement. It will reward the pioneer men and women of the lower Rio Grande valley from Albuquerque to Old Mexico, and it will justify the faith of the people of the southwest who have staked their all on the fertility of the soil and the ability of the project to carry the waters to the lands when most needed. Above all, it will be a perpetual monument to the irrigation Congress, which has been conducting a great empire-building campaign for the past twenty-five years."

"We anticipate that President Wilson will be accompanied by several members of his official family, including Hon. Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, and probably other members of his cabinet; Hon. A. A. Jones, first assistant secretary of the interior; Judge Will R. King, chief counsel; and other members of the reclamation service."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—A phase of the United States house of representatives' contempt proceedings against U. S. District Attorney H. Snowden Marshall of New York comes

up in the United States supreme court here today.

The contempt proceedings grew out of the U. S. indictments against Congressman Frank Buchanan of Illinois and other members of Labor's National Peace council in connection with alleged German bomb plots said to have been hatched in the United States.

Congressman Buchanan, charging irregularity in the actions of Marshall in handing the case before the federal grand jury, got a congressional investigating committee appointed to come to New York and probe Marshall's acts.

The investigating congressmen, displeased with what they considered Marshall's snippy attitude toward them and their investigation, halted him before the house of representatives for contempt.

GERMANS REPULSE RUSSIAN ATTACKS

Official Statement Says Slavs Are Forced Back on Every Front.

BERLIN, Aug. 15.—German and Austrian official statements reported that Russian attacks had been repulsed on practically every front. The Russians vainly attacked north-east of Stanislaw and suffered heavily.

Strong assaults were defeated near Lup and Graberka. Austrian officials said: "On Archduke Karl's front our troops maintained their positions against violent enemy attacks. West of Stanislaw we repulsed two Russian divisions in a thirty-six hour battle. Hindenburg repulsed Russian mass attacks. Over Brody an Austrian aeroplane set afire and destroyed a Russian Albatross aeroplane. The Russian imperial guard suffered heavily in attacking the Stochod front."
