STEFFANSSON TO REMAIN IN THE FROZEN NORTH

Arctic Explorer Will Continue to Explore Newly Discovered Lands.

NOME, Alaska, Aug. 17.—Viktor Steffansson, the Arctic explorer, who went into the far north regions in the summer of 1914 will not return to civilization this year, according to word brought here in the Steffansson party, who arrived on the schooner Alaska during the night. Instead, he will continue to explore newly discovered land north of Prince Patrick land.

The party aboard the Alaska, under Dr. Rudolph Anderson, Steffansson's chief subordinate, has been exploring and charting the coast line bordering Union and Dolphin straits and the Coronation gulf region far to the east of the mouth of the McKenzie river. All of the party on the Alaska, which left here in July, 1915, returned with the exception of Daniel Blue, engineer, who died on Bailey Island in May, 1915.

POLICE HUNT; LAD SLEEPS

Creek Dragged for Body of Boy Who Quietly Rests At Home.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 17.—Little Harlan Lucas, 16 years old, son of George E. Lucas, 2144 North New Jersey street, slept safely and no doubt soundly, in his room adjoining that of his parents at his home, not realizing even in his dreams, that a squad of policemen were dragging Fall creek in an effort to find his body.

The police rushed to the municipal bathing beach when Allen Martin and David Reiser reported that they had found the clothing of a small boy on the bank of the creek near the beach. A squad under Lieutenant Kelly in the police boat dragged the creek with grappling hooks until sunrise in an effort to find the body of the owner of the clothing.

The father of the boy saw the glory of the supposed drowning. He knew at once that the clothing belonged to his son from the description in the article and he immediately called up police headquarters and cleared up the mystery. He said that his son could not find his clothing when he came out of the water late Saturday afternoon and that he made his way down an alley to the home of his grandmother in his bathing suit and borrowed some clothing to wear home.

PRISONER FLEES 6 TIMES FROM JOLIET PRISON

Notorious Convict Makes Record in Comparatively Short Career.

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—Clyde Stratton, notorious convict, and two other prisoners escaped from the Illinois penitentiary at Joliet yesterday. It was the sixth time Stratton has broken out of some prison in a comparatively short criminal career. William A. Hart and William McGlade, the other two to escape, were serving life sentences for murder. The flight was not discovered until last night when the guards checked up the prisoners who had been allowed the freedom of the corridors in the cellhouse until 9 o'clock during the hot weather.

Stratton is the convict who escaped from Leavenworth prison by crawling a mile through a sewer. Four times before that he had proved the futility of prison bars. This time he was serving a 14-year sentence for the murder of a banker at Silvia, Ill.

Stratton has had a picturesque career. He was arrested in righty furnished apartment here soon after the League murder in the McVicker building several years ago and was turned over to the federal authorities for a postoffice robbery and was sent to Leavenworth. Guns, ammunition and such loot were found in his apartments. Previous to his Leavenworth escape, Stratton twice got out of the Ohio penitentiary.

A hole bored in the roof of the cell corridor at Joliet prison furnished the means of escape for the three convicts who got out last night. It was found today by investigators directed by Warden Michael Zimmer. Warden Zimmer has instituted an investigation.
