JAPANESE EDITOR SAYS HIS COUNTRY IS REAL "YELLOW PERIL"

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22.—Song Tsung Fong, associate editor of a Swiss newspaper, now in California, believes that Japan is the great "Yellow Peril" against which the United States must guard.

"When anyone sees in the great growth of Nippon a terrible threat against the future of the United States, he sees a fact," says the editor.

"The Japanese spy system is unsurpassed. The Hawaiian Islands are crowded with Jap spies. If it were possible to send a German submarine from Bremen to Baltimore, there is nothing to prevent Japan from sending a submarine to attack the western coast of the United States. There is nothing to prevent such a move should the Japanese government at any time sever relations with the government of the United States."

BRUTAL MURDER FOUND
BY POLICE IN CHICAGO

Woman With Head Crushed in
and Two Children Horribly Beaten.

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—The police have found the corpse of Mrs. John Labelle, aged nineteen, at a south side lodging house. Her head was crushed and wedged between the bed and wall.

The woman's two children were lying unconscious. Both were terribly beaten and nearly starved. The youngest will probably die. The murder occurred several days ago. The body was so decomposed it was difficult to determine whether it was male or female.

BOMB PLOTTERS ENTER PLEA OF NOT GUILTY

Counsel Withdraws Motion to
Quash Indictments—Asks
30 Days for Defense.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22.—Warren K. Billings, Thomas J. Moore and Mrs. Rena Mooney pleaded not guilty to murder charges in connection with the preparedness parade dynamiting. Defense Counsel McNutt withdrew the defendant's motions to quash the indictments.

Judge Griffin late this afternoon hears the arguments for motions to quash the indictments against Edward Nolan and Israel Weinburg. McNutt told the judge he wanted thirty days to prepare the defense.

FARMERS' CONFERENCE
TO CHECK THE ANNUAL
\$1,000,000,000 WASTE

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—An economy campaign of nation-wide extent will be started by American farmers at the fourth national conference on marketing and farm credits, called today to meet in Chicago, Dec. 4-9, at the Hotel Sherman. The campaign will begin with practical plans for checking enormous wastes in marketing farm products. This annual wastage is of billion-dollar magnitude, according to a statement of the general committee.

"The root of it lies in defective local organization of farmers," says Secretary Charles W. Holman of Madison, Wis., and the delegations will work out machinery for getting the local communities more tightly organized.

The national conference on marketing and farm credits is an open forum in the fourth year of its existence. At its meetings have been held in Chicago. In 1915 delegations came from forty-six states and from several provinces in Canada. On its general committee are Chairman Frank L. McVey, Grand Forks, N. D., president of the University of North Dakota; Governor Arthur Capper, Topeka, Kan.; H. J. Waters, Manhattan, Kan.; Lou D. Sweet, Denver, Colo.; L. S. Herffron, Lincoln, Neb.

GAVE BARNUM FAME

BALTIMORE, Aug. 21.—Today Hamilton died here yesterday. The veteran press agent of Barnum & Bailey's circus, whose seldom used baptismal name was Richard Francis, succumbed to heart failure at the home of his brother-in-law W. Howard Gibson, 3623 Old York road. He was 70 years old. Barnum once confessed that he owed more to his success to "Tody" Hamilton than to any other man. At the height of his career as a press agent Hamilton invented the smashing style of the circus program on which alliteration and adjectival were the most compelling features.

IDAHO PROGRESSIVES
CANNOT STAND HUGHES

Col. Ingersoll Says Standard
Oil Decision Against Public Welfare.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 22.—Col. James M. Ingersoll of Pocatello, former progressive national committeeman of Idaho is another prominent progressive who refuses to follow the leadership of Hughes.

Colonel Ingersoll arrived in Portland Saturday night on his way to the beach for a vacation.

"I stood by Colonel Roosevelt while he claimed to be for a square deal in our economic affairs," said he at the Hotel Portland. "I quit the colonel when he asked me to support Candidate Hughes, who believes in giving the Standard Oil and all other monopolistic combines a free hand."

"I like President Wilson much better than I do his party but I cannot support Hughes under any circumstances."

Court Decision Recalled.

"His supreme court decision in the Standard Oil and tobacco trust cases laid down a rule of law that gives all monopolistic combines a free hand, with a soft pedal suggestion by the court that the monopolies be regulated by their demands."

"These decisions practically nullify the criminal end of the Sherman anti-trust law."

"Everyone should read Justice Harlan's dissenting opinion in these cases."

"Now it is simply impossible to punish trust magnates because what one court and jury might hold to be unreasonable another court and jury might hold to be reasonable."

"Since Candidate Hughes and his associates handed down these decisions the monopolies have had and are now having a free hand to extort money from our people."
