What the Picture Theaters Have to Tell You.

"A Tortured Heart" Picture Tells Story of Evils of Village Gossip. In the quaint setting of an old-fashioned southern church is enacted a scene of pretty effect in William Fox's photodrama, "A Tortured Heart," starring Virginia Pearson. The Rev. Joseph Lockmore (Stephen Grattan), village pastor, finds a foudling on the steps of his church, and the townspeople scorn his interest in the child, who grows up to be a beautiful young woman, a part taken by Marian Swayne.

In the rectory parlor the splinters of the little town assemble to see the baby. About the only one who is interested in the pretty child is Lucile Darrell (Miss Pearson), a wealthy unmarried woman of the community.

From this point the story unfolds its tale of the evils of gossip, uncharitableness and all that these unwholesome qualities bring in "heart torture." Stuart Holmes in his villainous part as Leon Muller, does his best to bring suffering to the characters and his power of evil seems at first greater than the kindly parson's power for good.

Pastime today.
