Daily Chats With the Housewife

INTERESTING REPORT.

An interesting report that should be read by all young girls who are planning to earn their living and looking about for ways to do it has just been issued by the intercollegiate bureau of occupations for women. This bureau tries to point out ways other than teaching by which women may become self-supporting and though it works in the interest of college women, it is nevertheless of a good deal of help and inspiration to other women.

In this particular report emphasis is laid on the fact that there is greater demand than supply in the branch of dietetics. Good dietitians are rare and the girl who is interested in this line of domestic economy will do well to study the subject.

There are calls for the trained dietitian from clubs, hospitals and many institutions, both private and public, and the report says that the woman who has a thorough training in one of the recognized economic training schools will find herself in demand.

The main thing for the enterprising girl, however, is to get hold of this report herself and study what it has to say on many points. The address of the bureau will be given to any one on request. SALT A BEAUTIFIER.

Salt acts as an astringent to the skin. The woman who understands its proper uses is never without a simple and decidedly efficient first aid to beauty. Never use salt on a dirty skin, for this will close the pores, and with it all the dirt and grime accumulated during the day. Salt water should be used as an astringent only after the regular cleansing process has been completed.

The best method of procedure is to take a piece of soft cloth or a wash cloth wrung out of water as hot as you can stand and use it to remove

the cream and incidentally the dust from the face. Close the pores with cold water, to which you have added a generous pinch of salt.

STOWAWAY CHESTS.

The upholstered stowaway chest is becoming a regular piece of bedroom furniture, and the newest have tall end pieces that give the chest a stately effect. To have a fabric that matches or harmonizes with the other furniture in the room is essential in the covering.

THE HOME MANICURE.

The wide part of the nail scissors is the part to use when cutting the nails. Even this is not so good as filing. The points of the manicure scissors are meant to be for cuticle. A lot of unnecessary manicure implements are useless and insanitary. A good pair of surberon's scissors, a thin file, several pieces of emery board, a polish, if you use one, and a good nail brush are enough. The latter is most important. Never cut the cuticle; push it back every day, rubbing the dry parts with cold cream to soften them if they are hard—but never cut it.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Milk will burn easily, but this can be rectified in the following way: pour the boiling milk into a clean pitcher and stand in a basin of cold water until cool.

To wash hairbrushes mix together a tablespoonful of liquid ammonia and about a quart of water. Do not wet the back of the brush. Rinse in clear cold water.

In ironing a garment on which hooks are sewn, care should be taken not to close the hooks. You can prevent this by placing flannel or anything soft beneath the hooks.

If there is not maid to serve the dinner, put a traycloth on a wheeled tray and stand it beside you at the table. Dessert and side dishes can be easily served from this tray.
