MANY FOREIGN INQUIRIES FOR FLOUR

Farmers of Pacific Northwest Much Less Inclined to Sell; Hog Prices Take an Advance of 15c; Cattle Market is Steady.

PORTLAND, Aug. 25.—Reports indicate that Europe is not only a very anxious and persistent buyer of wheat in the United States at this time but that much nibbling is shown for cargoes of flour.

Milling interests are not talking for publication regarding this phase of the market, but the reports of foreign inquiries for our flour come from reliable and well informed sources.

While there was a very erratic tone in the early wheat trading at Chicago during the day, the actual cash wheat situation is continued strong. This is true especially of the middle west, where export interests are literally "baying their heads off" in the wheat market.

Farmers in the Pacific northwest are much less inclined to sell than they were a short time ago. Total sales of wheat to date this season in the three states are approximately inclined to estimate sales at an additional 5,000,000 bushels.

Biannual cable from Liverpool that the wheat market opened very firm with scarcity of shippers. On passage wheat opened firm, 29 1/2c advance.

Russia.—General reports are now coming in to confirm advice received from our agents that crop prospects are now favorable. The area sowed was reduced by exigencies of war, heavy holding of old crop inhibited against sowing, planting weather from time to time has been unfavorable and general rains caused damage.

Italy.—Consumptive demand in the United Kingdom has fallen off owing to the hay crop, but the continent continues to purchase foreign sorts on a large scale and mostly from United States. Import needs are large.

European crops backward and prospects mostly under last year's.

Chicago wheat closed lower for the day, but the Portland market was firmer. On the Merchants Exchange bids for August wheat were unchanged to 1c higher, with earliest touching a new high mark at \$1.25.

Now that Portland interests are through bidding on the government contract, and one local firm has secured the order, the price to be paid the producer is being lowered. Up to the time that the government contract was let the market was held aloft.

Barley bids were unchanged and steady on the exchange during the day.

Hog prices were lifted to \$5.75 during the early morning trade at North Portland. This was an advance of 15c over previous prices received this week.

The advance in swine values was made here in the face of a rather fair supply. The talk that Portland was not paying as much as other markets and especially California, does not hold water when it was shown during the day that shipments of California hogs were received in the local yards during the day. If prices were higher in the south than here, these shipments would not come here.

GIRL GIVES UP LIFE TO SAVE HER SISTER

Seven Year Old Child Gets Beyond Death in Columbia River—14 Year Old Sister Goes to Rescue.

THE DALLES, Ore., Aug. 24.—In an effort to save her 7 year old sister Ethel from drowning in the Columbia river yesterday near Lytle, Wash., Myrtle Gutcher, 14 years old, sacrificed her own life. Ethel was rescued by a farmer working near the scene of the tragedy, and resuscitated, but the older sister could not be revived when pulled from the water 45 minutes later.

The two girls were in bathing in the river when Ethel stepped into deep water. In attempting to pull her sister out, Myrtle lost her balance and was carried into deep water by the current. Cries of Mrs. F. Gutcher, mother of the girls, who was on the bank brought a farmer to the scene. Diving into the water he succeeded in recovering the younger sister, who was unconscious. He then made a drag out of barbed wire, with which the body of the older sister was finally recovered.
