### NEW FOX PICTURE TELLS HOW GIRL REFORMS BOLD, MAD MAN

George Walsh and Anna Luther Are Stars of "The Beast," Which Tells Old Story of East, and New story of West.

How a little eastern girl was taken prisoner by a rough man from the west, was nursed by him back to health and happiness, and then released to go back to her parents, is told in William Fox's latest screen play, "The Beast." Anna Luther and George Walsh are the stars of this new picture.

The story starts with David Manning (Herschel Mayall), master of millions, whirling through the western country in his special car, to view some of his mining holdings. Sir Charles Beverly (Edward Cecil), his guest falls in love with Manning's beautiful daughter, Mildred (Anna Luther). Sir Charles' one object in life is to gain the Manning millions. The girl is not enthusiastic about this typical Briton, who is ever at her elbow—even when the special halted by a slight wreck ahead she goes for a little hunt about to view the typical town of Gopherville.

In Gopherville Sir Charles causes no end of amusement with his extraordinary attire. Mildred has seen fit to go on a little exploring expedition of her own, by the time Sir Charles has lost all his money at faro. Mildred having heard wild rumors from "The Double Stamp" dance hall is eager to look on from a safe distance. A Mexican leads her into a rear room which is cut off from the main floor by heavy draperies. He then snatches her purse, locks the door, and escapes. Mildred's only hope of leaving the place is to enter the dance hall boldly and offer herself as a target for the revelers. She cannot summon courage enough for that. She remains hidden.

Meanwhile the dance hall is the scene of an outburst of excitement. Del Burton's cowboys, with Del at their head and three months' wages in their pockets, have come to town. Two men burst into Mildred's retreat. Immediately they are enamored of their prize, each claims the girl as his own. They are about to fight it out, gun fashion, when Del Burton (George Walsh), a ranch owner, breaks in on the action. The girl appeals to his liquor inflamed mind. He offers to fight for her. After a terrific battle he is victorious. The girl is his.

Meanwhile, Sir Charles is confident that Mildred has returned to the private car. The Mexican who has robbed the girl leads him to believe such is the case, and the train pulls out leaving Mildred the personal property of the man she calls "The Beast."

Del Burton with Mildred in his arms has left the town. He carries her senseless form, as he spurs his horse along the trail. In fording a rushing stream, he nearly loses his life. He never relaxes his grasp on Mildred, although he has lost his senses in fighting the river. The girl, too, is senseless. When Burton again regains consciousness he fears that Mildred is dead. Then he learns she is alive and nurses her back to health and strength. But she scorns the man as a Beast, though he declares she need fear him no longer—he is a tamed Beast.

Mildred is returned to her friends and father on the special train. As the cars sweep forward on their journey the last Mildred sees is the figure of the Beast, mounted on horseback and silhouetted against the skyline. And there comes a smile to her lips for he was all man.

Back in her home, Mildred is hostess at a brilliant social function. Her heart is in the west and the picture in her mind is that of the great and wonderful Del Burton, a thousand times superior to the dawdling men she must now entertain. But Burton is closer at hand than she believes. He is looking on from the shadows of a nearby tree. The gateway of the lawn for him reminds him that such a world as this he has never known.

Then a new Croesus, a cattle made millionaire, comes to the city. He is made much of. Dressed as the other men Del Burton takes in the grandeur of city life. Even Mildred is deceived and the climax comes only on the night of a great masquerade ball. Then the butler announces the last guest, "The Beast," and Del Burton goes to the girl of his heart. Once again he is clad in the garments of the far, far west. The big boots, the sombrero, the chaps, the complex outfit she had come to know so well in the moment of her peril, fills her eyes, and Love rings down a triumphant curtain.
