MAN IS CALLED DEAD TWICE.

Salesman's Death Was Twice Published, and Yet He Lives.

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Sept. 1.—Peter Bauer, a piano salesman here, has survived the second announcement of his death. The latest was recently made in Pottsville, Pa., and the earlier one about five years ago in Cleveland. In both instances the erroneous announcements were the result of mistaken identities.

Bauer has just received a clipping from the Pottsville Banner, sent him by his brother, telling him he was supposed to have been drowned last week at Huron, O. Bauer's insistence that he is very much alive means that the authorities must start all over trying to identify the body recently washed ashore at the Lake Erie port.

Five years ago a man who dropped dead on a Cleveland street was at first identified as Bauer. At that time he was living at Garfield, O., and it was some time before he convinced the public that he was alive.

COWS LIKE PHONOGRAPH MUSIC

Raztime in the Barn Increases the Flow and Stops Talk of Milkers.

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 1.—Raztime music at milking time is an innovation on the dairy farm of W. W. Wilcox, east of Denver. He says the hard shows its appreciation by yielding an increased amount of lactical fluid. He recently installed a phonograph in one end of the barn.

"It serves two purposes," explained Wilcox. "It keeps the cows quiet. Cows have aesthetic, musical temperaments. It keeps the men from talking and forgetting their work. Constant interruption by talking interferes with the flow of milk and lessens the quantity the cow would yield otherwise."

"The music charms and soothes the bovine soul as nothing else can, and under such conditions she will allow even an ordinary milker a greatly increased quantity."

"I know she pays for the music."

Cattle Stand After Death.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Sept. 1.—Observing that two helpers and four calves in a pasture near his farm, six miles north, had been standing in the same position all day, Peter Lauritzen investigated and was amazed to discover that the animals were dead.
