NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—St. John Gaffney, who was forced to resign as consul general at Munich, Germany, after the administration became convinced of his pro-German leanings, has arrived here on board the Scandinavian-American liner Frederick VII, bitter against the English, and the democratic party. He announced that he had come home to work for the election of Charles Evans Hughes. In a statement which he issued he said:

"I consider the government of England as totally without morality, insolent beyond bearing, inflated with vanity and ambition, aiming at the exclusive domination of the seas, lost to corruption and deep-rooted hatred toward us, hostile to liberty; wherever it endeavors to show its head and the eternal disturber of the peace of the world."
