Daily Chats With the Housewife

STOP WIPING DISHES.

Mrs. Helen Ruggles, a prominent teacher and lecturer on domestic economy, says:

"I am very strongly in favor of not wiping the dishes. It does away with the problem of dish towels, and saves a great deal of work. I use this large draining rack, which can be got for \$1.25 anywhere, and which lasts a long time. Into it I put the dishes of all sizes, after they have been thoroughly washed in hot suds. Over them I pour hot water, then cover them with a clean piece of cheesecloth and leave them to dry. On the floor in front of the sink is a rubber mat. It is easy for the feet, and prevents soiling the linoleum on the floor. I use the luncheon cart to wheel out and back all my dishes which go into the china closet. At the left of the sink I keep this stenciled little stand which I use all over the kitchen, wheeling my things from place to place. It is on rubber casters and is very light."

LUNCHEON DISH.

Melt a tablespoon of butter in the frying pan, and one onion cut up and when slightly browned add six fresh tomatoes peeled and cut up or two cups of canned tomatoes, then add salt and pepper to taste. When the tomatoes and onions are cooked beat three eggs and stir into the mixture and when cooked remove from fire and serve hot on toast.

SALMON SANDWICHES.

Remove the bones from one can of salmon and discard the liquid. Mash and mix to a smooth paste with mayonnaise or boiled dressing. Spread on thin slices of well buttered bread. Place a crisp lettuce leaf in each sandwich and cut into triangles. Wrap each sandwich in paraffin paper.

BEAUTIFY THE NAILS.

The little white crescents at the base of the finger nails can be developed by daily soaking the fingers in warm, soapy water and gently pressing the soft cuticle with an orange-wood stick. Trim off any rough particles of cuticle, but do not cut any oftener than is really necessary. By daily care as directed above, the growth of cuticle will be slow. A little grease rubbed on the cuticle at night will also help to keep the cuticle from splitting.

SOAP JELLY.

"I have recently made a discovery that has helped me ever so much and I should like to pass it on," said the mother of a large family. "It has always been a bit of a puzzle to me to know what to do with the fragments of toilet soap which accumulate with unbelievable rapidity in the bathroom. It seems wasteful to throw them away, yet I could find no use for them. Finally I hit on the plan of putting them in a pint fruit jar and filling the jar half full of hot water. This makes a soap jelly which I use for washing out dainty blouses, collars and so on, and for shampooing. I keep a jar in each bathroom, adding new pieces of soap as they grow too small to use. Now I always have a jar of pure soap jelly on hand for use at all times."

HONEY WITH GRAPEFRUIT.

Sweetening with honey instead of sugar gives a delicious flavor to grapefruit. All kinds of preserved small fruits, maple syrup and fresh crushed fruits also may be used in grapefruit.

JUST ONIONS.

"Onions without an apology"—that is the way one cook characterizes some of the recipes she has for serving this homely vegetable in ways that are beyond reproach. Raw onions, especially the strong varieties, must in most cases be used principally for seasoning; but there are many modes of cooking the large mild Bermuda onions, and even the cruder varieties, that quite transform this odorous tuber.

Onion Souffle—Cook 4 medium-size onions until tender, about 1 hour, and pass through a vegetable press. Add the pulp to 1 cup of thick white sauce, made by blending 4 tablespoons of flour with 3 tablespoons of butter and 1 cup of milk. Separate the yolks and whites of 3 eggs, add the beaten yolks to the sauce with 1 tablespoon of chopped parsley, then cut and fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Turn into a buttered baking dish, set in a pan of water, and bake in a moderate oven 2 minutes or until firm.

Baked Onions—Peel and cut into thick slices large white onions. Par-boil in plenty of salted water, drain well, and arrange in a buttered baking dish. Dot with bits of butter and bake until soft and a pale yellow. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, and cover with 12 inch layer of grated crumbs thickly dredged with grated cheese. Return to the oven long enough to melt the cheese. Add cream sauce and serve.

Onion Croquettes—Pound to a paste onions that have been freed from bones and skin. Add 6 grated onions.

1-2 cup of bread crumbs, 1 saltspoon of salt and dash of cayenne pepper, 1 tablespoon of mushroom liquor, and sufficient sauce to form a croquette mixture. Form and fry in deep fat. Onion Custard—Cook until tender 2 cups of sliced Spanish onions, adding 1 bay leaf, 1 stalk of celery, a pinch of allspice, 1 tablespoon of minced parsley, and 1-2 teaspoon of salt, using as little water as possible. Remove from the fire and press through a puree sieve, stirring in a tiny pinch of baking power to correct the slight acidity. Then add 2 well beaten eggs that have been diluted with 2 tablespoons of thick cream, and turn the mixture at once into small greased custard cups. Set them into a pan of hot water and bake 25 minutes in a moderate oven. Unmold on a chop platter, cover with a cream sauce to which a cup of cooked peas has been added, and serve.

MILLING DEMAND HAS EFFECT ON WHEAT BIDS

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 12.—Wheat prices were easier and generally lower in leading world's markets for the day. With Liverpool cables showing a loss of 1 to 2d there was a natural tendency on the part of the Chicago shorts to sell still further and that market's initial values were set off.

Locally the situation is somewhat mixed. Prices here are from the time forth to be governed more by the milling demand than by the outside markets. The scramble for business is exceedingly keen. There is little of this high grade milling wheat sold in the country and of the reason some excited prices are expected to develop.

While there is more or less talk of an immediate advance of 25c per barrel in the price of patent flour, no changes were shown during the day because of weakness in outside wheat markets.
