Mr. Herz is starred in this production and Irene Howley, the charming and fascinating young actress, is featured. Others in a strong supporting cast include Alan Hale, Howard Truesdell, George Pauncefoot, Guido Colucci, Gretchen Hartman, Mrs. William Betchel and Cora Williams. There are scores of marvelous scenes in "The Purple Lady," including interesting situations staged at Coney Island on a holiday at that resort; scenes aboard a transatlantic steamship, and many colorful scenes photographed in a famous restaurant on Broadway. "The Purple Lady" is a pictureization of the successful play of the same name written by Sydney Rosenfeld.

At the Alta.

There are eyes of blue, there are brown eyes, too, there are eyes of every color and every hue," so sang a songster some time since and he must have just come from witnessing a performance of the Famous Bostonians, which until this year had never permitted a man to perform in any of their plays.

Mrs. E. Lang, who directs the company of young women, surprised everyone when she named an Australian tenor, Charlie Bennett, to play the male leads. He makes his appearance for the first time in "Tipperary Mary," a delightful tale of Ireland in the sixteenth century. There is quick wit, droll comedy, and tasteful scenery making it in all an entertainment well worth while.

Adventure, with provoking incidents, dancing, singing and humorous dialogue have been well shaken in the box of spice labeled "Iroma," a play which soft breezes blew in from the Sunny Climes of the Pacific and will drop down on the stage of Alta theater on Sept. 22 as their second offering. "Tipperary Mary" opens the engagement on Thursday evening.

"The Golden Slipper" is a musical melange with amusing situations and graceful dancing and will be offered as their third entertainment. The beautiful story of the Paradise of the Pacific, "The Rose of Honolulu," is taken from an ancient tale of Hawaii. The music is charming and the dances sensational.

At the Cosy. The quaint story of the adoption, education and later-day romance of Miss Petticoats, granddaughter of an old New Bedford whaling captain has been immortalized on the screen through the efforts of William A. Brady, who has had the famous story of "Miss Petticoats" adapted to motion pictures, and filmed under the direction of Harley Knoles, with a strong cast, headed by Alice Brady, supported by such star players as Arthur Ashley, Johnny Hines, Alex R. Francis and Mildred Havens.

A company consisting of 25 actors and actresses invaded the quiet coast of New Bedford, on the rocky coast of the state of Massachusetts, and there proceeded to film the story of Miss Petticoats, who, in the story of Dwight Tilton's book, is a New Bedford girl, the granddaughter of a fishing schooner captain. The life of the girl while on the old fishing vessel, in the cotton mills, and while secretary and companion in a fashionable home has been photographed in its entirety in the atmosphere and locale used by the author of the book. An old schooner was prepared, where the scenes were filmed, and Miss Brady, the star in this feature photoplay, spent several days in one of the big mills working herself.

It is not exaggerating matters in the least in saying that no motion picture has yet been produced in which the producing company was so successful in procuring exactly the required locale for all its scenes as this feature version of "Miss Petticoats," which is the attraction coming at the Cosy theater on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Public Speaking New Class at High School. Superintendent Park is forming classes today—Students Allowed to Take Subject When Desired.

Classes in public speaking are today being formed by Superintendent Park and the class will be ready for work by tomorrow. The students will be allowed to take the subjects as often as desired and in any periods desired. It is hoped that by this arrangement many will be able to take the subject that otherwise could not. It is probable that some students in these classes will take up debate as well as public speaking. Those taking up debate will be given credit in addition to the possibilities of making the team. It is not the object of public speaking classes to take up debate as much as it is the principles of speaking which will be studied from every available source.

The subject will be taught by Superintendent Park.

LAMB AND POTATO AU GRATIN. Melt a heaping tablespoon of butter, blend in a tablespoonful of flour, then add slowly 1 cup of milk. Stir until smooth, season with pepper, salt and a tablespoon of chopped parsley; then add 1 1/2 cups of chopped, cooked lamb, 1 1/2 cups of chopped, cooked potatoes, and 1/2 cup of walnut meats broken in small pieces. Turn into a buttered baking dish, sprinkle with crumbs, dot with little bits of butter and bake until brown in a moderate oven. Serve in the dish that it is baked in.

MORE THAN 40 HURT IN N. Y. STREETCAR ACCIDENT

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Over forty were injured in four railroad strike accidents today. The strikebreakers are unable to control the cars. A jitney carrying many girls upset on the Williamsburg bridge, hurling the girls under automobiles and horses' hoofs.

A third avenue car jumped the track and hit a pole. The motorman and two passengers were hurt. Two Bronx cars collided and many passengers jumped.
