### To Build Hay Palace.

Walter Rees of Hermiston, arrived yesterday and work of constructing the hay palace on the old Happy Canyon grounds on Main street will be commenced at once. The structure will be used for exhibiting products of the west end of the county.

Kern being the bartender in charge. Dell Blanchett, well known cowboy, has the distinction of having spent the first money in the new Happy Canyon. Before the dance started he paid 50 cents for a drink and the coin will be framed. Another dance will be held there this evening, and of course there will be dancing plenty there during the four nights of the show.

### CHANGES IN WEDDING CEREMONY APPROVED

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Leaders in the national woman suffrage movement gave unqualified approval today to the recommendation of the special commission on the revision of the prayer book of the Episcopal church that the ceremony of matrimony be revised so that the vows for the woman and the man will be identical. The suffragists were pleased most of all that the word "obey" probably is to come out. They were almost equally delighted over the recommendation for the elimination of the "giving away" of the woman. They rejoiced that the promise of the bridegroom "with all my worldly goods, I thee endow" is to be dropped. The proposal that Isaac and Rebecca no longer were to be mentioned in the post nuptial prayer as a model marriage couple also pleased the women.

### PRESIDENT DECIDES UPON SPEED UP CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—President Wilson and McCormick have decided to speed up the campaign. They intend to conduct the closing fight from the summer White House. They plan several "Jersey days" suffrage receptions. Wilson's first political porch speech will be made Saturday. He addresses the Trenton Businessmen's League. On Monday he goes to Baltimore and addresses the National Grain Dealers' Association.

## JOHNSON HAS ALL PARTIES UNDER POWER

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 19.—Governor Johnson absolutely controlled the republican state convention which opened this afternoon. He also dominated the progressive convention. Johnson's opposition disappeared over night. Hardly twenty voices were raised against him. The five parties' conventions, republican, progressive, democratic, prohibition, socialist, postponed their sessions this morning until this afternoon to enable them to caucus and line up delegates.

### FALSE BRANDING CHARGE.

Twelve Barrels of Whisky Labeled "Beer" Seized at Baker.

BAKER, Ore., Sept. 19.—Twelve barrels evidence to be used in charges against G. H. Tribe & Co., liquor dealers of Ogden, Utah, are on their way to Portland, according to United States Revenue Collector J. S. Smith. The barrels still contain the whisky and are labeled "Beer," just as they were received and seized by Mr. Smith at the American Express office here last week. They were shipped today.

Mr. Smith says there will be 12 counts against the company, one for each barrel and one for a receipted bill for shipment. The charge will be either misbranding an interstate liquor shipment or conspiracy, he says.
