

# Twenty-Eight Wonderful Events at The Round-Up

1. Riding bucking back steers, horses and mules. (Aerial.)

**Cowboys Pony Race.**  
Purse—\$150, to be divided \$50 each day. First, \$25; second, \$15; third, \$10.

Conditions—Half mile race. Cowboy saddle to weigh not less than 25 pounds. Riders to ride with chaps and sombrero. Winning horse eliminated each day.  
(Thirty entries in this event. Everybody gets in who gets to the paddock when the race is called.)

**Saddle Race.**  
Purse—\$150, to be divided \$50 each day. First, \$25; second, \$15; third, \$10.

Conditions—One half mile race for Indian horse and ridden only by full blooded Indians camping on the grounds. Winning horse eliminated each day.

**Cowboys Relay Race for the Championship of World.**  
Purse—\$1000 and trophies. First, \$500.

Conditions—A three day race, two miles each day. Each rider to have four horses in charge of two assistants, one to hold and one to catch. Rider to saddle, unsaddle, mount and dismount unassisted. Change horses each half mile. Same horses to be used each day barring accident. Riders to ride with chaps and sombrero. Saddles to weigh not less than 25 pounds. No chimes barred. Best time for three days wins. In case of lost horses jumping the fence and all other unforeseen contingencies, the decision of the judges to govern. Riders will draw for place in paddock first day and after first day take place in order in which they finish.

**Steer Hauling for the Championship of World.**  
Purse—\$200. First, \$125, and genuine beaver Stetson hat, value \$20, presented by Bond Bros., clothiers, Pendleton, Ore.; second, \$50; third, \$25.

Conditions—Steer to be given 30 feet start. Bulldozer to furnish own horse and harness. Contestant must throw steer with bare hands and not touch teeth to lips until steer is down. Steer must be thrown flat on ground on his side. Any contestant handling steer will be disqualified and all questions as to cleanliness of throw and fall will be left entirely to the judges whose decision shall be final.

2. When thrown steer must be held by lip and hands released. Time limit two minutes. Best time for three days wins.

An entrance fee of \$7.50 each will be charged in this event, which will be added to the purse of \$50, \$25 and \$25.

**Cowboy Standing Race.**  
Purse—\$150, to be divided \$50 each day. First, \$25; second, \$15; third, \$10.

Conditions—One half mile race. Each contestant to have two horses, allowing one assistant to start at gong and rise within 50 yards.

**Cowgirls Bucking Contest for Championship of World.**  
Purse—\$250. First, \$125; second, \$75; third, \$50.

Conditions—Contestant to ride each day. Horses to be furnished by management and riders to draw for mounts. All contestants to ride any horse and as often as judges may deem necessary to determine the winner. Riding to be done with plain halter and split reins. Rider may have the privilege of using help. No saddle fork over 15 1-2 inches wide to be used.

**Indian Pony Relay Race.**  
Purse—\$200. First, \$150; second, \$50; third, \$50.

Conditions—A three day race for Indian ponies to be ridden by full blooded Indians camping on the grounds. One mile each day. Each rider to have four horses in charge of four assistants. Rider to ride bareback and change horses each quarter of a mile. Same horses to be used each day, barring accidents. Best time for three days wins.

**Steer Hoping Contest for the Championship of World.**  
Purse—\$750. First, \$400; second, \$200 and 20 per cent of Jack Pot; third, \$100; and 20 per cent of Jack Pot; fourth, \$50 and 10 per cent of Jack Pot.

Conditions—Rope and hog tie three feet crossed; steer to have 30 feet start of rope. To be roped, thrown and hog-tied within two minutes or contestant to withdraw at signal from judges. Each roper to have two steers on Thursday and Friday. The eight ropers making the best time on these two steers will rope on Saturday one steer each. Best total time on three steers to be winners.

An entrance fee of \$25, will be charged, which will be added to the purse, 40, 30, 20 and 10.

**Maverick Race.**  
Purse—\$10 each day and 40-foot one-half inch lariat presented by Portland Cordage Company of Portland, Oregon.

Conditions—Wild steer to be given 100 feet start. Contestants to start at signal. First man getting rope on steer's horns and holding, wins.

**Indian Pony Race.**  
Purse—\$150, to be divided \$50 each day. First, \$25; second, \$15; third, \$10.

Conditions—Same as Indian square race.

**Cowboy and Cowgirls Grand Mounted March.**  
14. Spectacular Indian Parade.  
15. Trick Riding.  
16. Trick and Fancy Roping.  
17. Full blood Indian Ceremonials and War Dances.  
18. Goat Roping.  
Purse—\$250, to be divided \$150 for first, \$75 for second and \$25 for third.

19. Exhibition.

**Cowgirls Relay Race for Championship of World.**  
Purse—\$750 and trophies. First, \$200 and silver mounted saddle presented by Happy Canyon; second, \$200 and \$25 kodak presented by

Pendleton Drug Co., Pendleton, Ore.; third, \$100 and cut glass bottle of perfume containing real rose, presented by A. C. Koepfen & Bros., druggists, Pendleton.

Conditions—Same as cowboys relay race, except horses to be saddled when brought on the track.

**Indian Race (Thoroughbreds).**  
Purse—\$150 to be divided \$50 each day. First, \$25; second, \$15; third, \$10.

Conditions—One-half mile race for Indian thoroughbreds and ridden by full blooded Indians camping on the grounds. Winning horse eliminated each day.

**Stage Coach Race.**  
Purse, \$75 each day. First, \$50; second, \$25.

Conditions—Coaches will be furnished by the management. Each contestant allowed as many assistants as desired. Best time winner each day.

**Cowgirls Pony Race.**  
Purse, \$150, to be divided \$50 each day. First, \$25, second, \$15, third, \$10.

Conditions—Half mile race. Contestants to ride with cowboy saddles to weigh not less than 25 pounds. No contestant permitted on track wearing a jockey cap. Winning horse eliminated each day.

**Indian Race (Thoroughbreds).**  
Purse—\$150 to be divided \$50 each day. First, \$25; second, \$15; third, \$10.

Conditions—One-half mile race for Indian thoroughbreds and ridden by full blooded Indians camping on the grounds. Winning horse eliminated each day.

**Cowboys Bucking Contest for Championship of the World.**  
Purse—\$500 and trophies. First, \$500 and \$250 saddle made and presented by Hamley & Co., Pendleton, Ore.; second, \$200; third, \$100.

Conditions—Riders for each day to be determined by lot. Horses to be furnished by the management and riders to draw for mounts. Not less than six riders to be chosen on third day to ride in semi-finals and not less than three to be chosen from the six to ride in finals. Each contestant to ride as often as judges may deem necessary to determine winner. Riding to be done with plain halter, one end of rope free, with chaps, spurs and sombrero and no quilt, all riding slick, with no changing of hands on halter rope allowed. No saddle fork over 15 1-2 inches wide. Drawing for mounts Wednesday evening, September 20th, at 7 p. m.

**Tug of War.**  
Purse—\$25 each day. First, \$15; second, \$10.

Conditions—Start mounted, chaps on ground. Run 100 yards and remove saddle. Run 100 yards to starting point and put on chaps; run 100 yards to saddle and put on saddle, run to finish line, starting point. No rubber cinches allowed. Saddle must be cinched at start and finish and chaps properly buckled.

**Purse—\$150 and jackpot to be divided \$50 each day. First, \$25 and 50 per cent of jackpot; second, \$15 and 20 per cent of jackpot; third, \$10 and 20 per cent of jackpot.**

Conditions—The Round-Up will furnish unbroken range horses and riders will take mounts as delivered in front of the grandstand. Each rider to saddle and ride his mount once around the track, with halter only. Each rider allowed one assistant to help saddle but he must not lend any other assistance whatever or rider will be disqualified. Each rider to return his horse to the corral after the race. Riders will be scored in order of finishing. Entrance fee of \$25 to be added to the purse, 50, 30 and 20. On Saturday the wild horse race will be run between the semi-finals and finals in the cowboys' bucking contest.

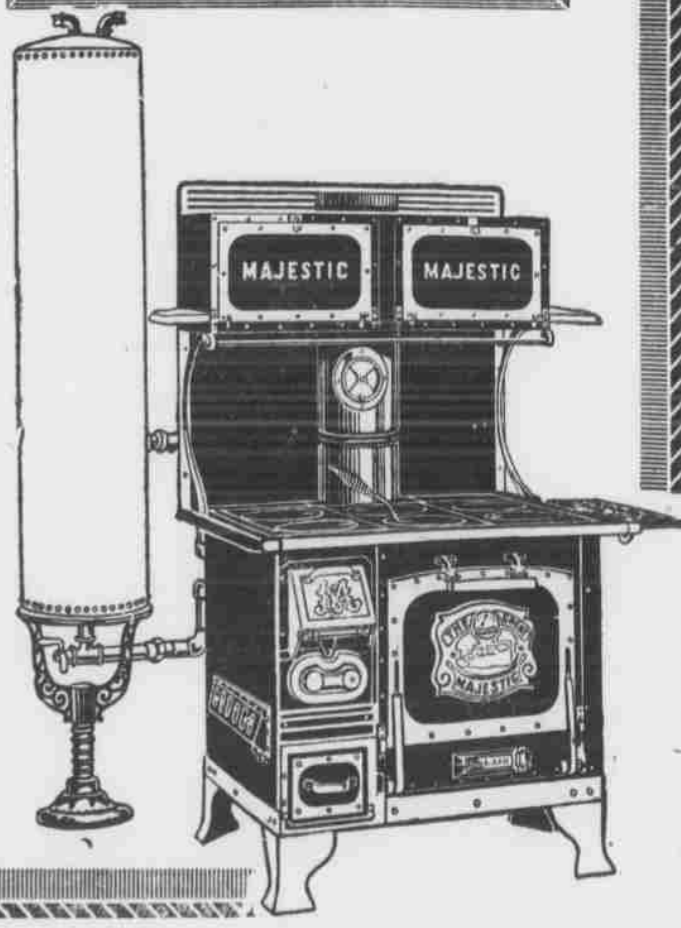
