"WHO IS ZAPILLAT" WHY. ZAPATA AND VILLA!
Author Katterjohn Knecaded Two Mexican Bandits Into One for Triangle-Hart Play of Patriotism.

What is said to be one of the most realistic characterizations ever attempted by a photo player is contributed by Roy Laidlaw to "The Patriot," the Triangle Kay Bee play by Monte M. Katterjohn, in which Thomas H. Ince presents William S. Hart as star. It is a composite impersonation of Zapata and Villa, the notorious Mexican bandits, and is declared to be one of the most striking portrayals in the piece.
When Laidlaw was first cast for the part, which is known by the name of "Zapilla," his initial move was to make an extensive collection of photographs showing each of the well known desperadoes in various poses from various angles. Then he set about to decide on a "make-up" that would best enable him to present a picture embodying the outstanding features of them all. This work, it is said, required nearly a week's time.
