LIVE STOCK MEN ARE PROSPEROUS

PORTLAND, Oct. 21.—Cattle men of interior Oregon are enjoying their greatest prosperity. This is the word brought to Portland by J. M. Thompson, a prominent livestock man of the Fossil section. "Farmers of Gilliam county could not help making money this season," says Mr. Thompson, "for the very good reason that they not only had excellent crops, but most excellent prices."

"The rains were so well distributed that the range was the best known for a great many years. The cattle of that section of Gilliam county around Fossil are rolling in fat. Just before I left Condon, wheat was selling at \$1.25 a bushel. That's prosperity in a nutshell."

Poor Cattle Are Steady. While there is a certain degree of weakness in the cattle market generally at North Portland, it is the poorer class of stuff that is holding about steady. Over night there was quite a fair run in the local yards. Cows continue rather weak, with tops at \$5.25 @ \$5.50.

General cattle market range: Prime light steers \$4.50 @ \$4.60; Prime heavy steers 6.70 @ 6.75; Good light steers 5.00 @ 5.25; Stockers and feeders 5.00 @ 5.50; Prime dehorned cows and heifers 5.50; Common cows 4.00 @ 5.00; Bulls 3.50 @ 4.50; Prime light veal calves 7.00 @ 7.50; Prime heavy veal calves 4.00 @ 6.00.

Hog Market Is Steady. Conditions in the hog market are steady at North Portland. Over night only a fair run was shown. Tops are still considered around \$9.25, but most of the trade inclines to the idea that selected quality would bring more.

General hog market: Choice light weights \$9.25; Good light weights \$9.00 @ \$9.20; Medium weights 8.75 @ 8.90; Rough heavy 8.00 @ 8.50.

Mutton and Lamb Firm. Mutton and lamb market is showing no change in prices at North Portland, but the trend of the trade is somewhat firmer, and higher prices during the immediate future would not be surprising. Only a very small run was shown over night.

PHYSICAL GIANT WHO SUSTAINED 50,000 VOLTS TO COLLECT \$15,000

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 21.—The United States circuit court of appeals today refused a rehearing in the case of P. R. Sheaff of Fairview, Nev., against the Pacific Power company, and Sheaff will now collect a judgment of \$15,000 from that corporation, awarded him by the lower court. Sheaff, a physical giant, was an employee of the power company in 1913, and while performing his work came in contact with a wire carrying 50,000 volts of electricity. He lived, despite the fact that 1700 volts is said to be fatal. The current passing through his body is said to have burned a hole in his right shoulder, taken several feet of skin from his back and burned the flesh from his feet. He is now said to be physically unfit for any character of work.

SEIZED LIQUOR SOLD. CHARGE

Railroad Avers Sheriff Hodge Permitted Unlawful Disposal.  
SEATTLE, Oct. 21.—The Chicago Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad through its attorney, today accused Sheriff Robert T. Hodge of permitting liquor seized in a freight car to be sold to a Seattle drug store, while Hodge alleges that the liquor was destroyed by his deputies.

The railroad company sent a letter asking the county commissioners to pay \$170, the value of liquor consigned by a Louisville distillery to a drug store at Renton, Wash., and seized by Hodge. The letter says: "As a matter of fact a portion, if not all, of this shipment was located in one of the downtown Second avenue drug stores, Seattle, having been sold to the proprietor of the drug store by a plainclothes man." The letter was turned over to prosecuting Attorney Landin who promised a thorough investigation.

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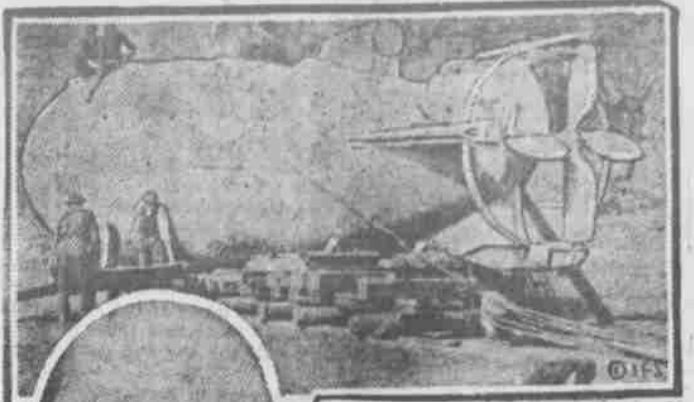
