HOG AND CATTLE MARKETS LOWER

PORTLAND, Oct. 22.—There was a slight decrease in offerings of hogs in the North Portland market for the week as compared with the previous six days, but the totals were greater than the preceding week.

Hog market prices were weaker and lower at North Portland during the period. Later the market steadied somewhat, but without showing an improvement in the price.

Cattle Market Lower. In practically all cattle markets offerings at North Portland for the week a weaker tone and lower prices were shown. Receipts during the week were somewhat less than during the previous week, but practically all of the big killers have a surplus on hand and for that reason are not inclined to encourage shipments at the moment.

In proportion the poorer class cattle held better than the finer offerings during the week.
