CATTLE KING'S HEIRS MAY HAVE TO PAY \$8,000,000 TAX

Estate Estimated at Between \$20,000,000 and \$40,000,000 — Action Will Be Under New Law.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 26.—A federal government tax running into millions of dollars will be levied upon the estate of Henry Miller, cattle king, who died a week ago leaving an estate variously estimated at from \$20,000,000 to \$40,000,000, it became known here. The tax will be claimed under a provision of the federal revenue act passed by the last congress which provides for a graduated tax on inherited estates.
