GOSPEL MEETINGS DRAW THROUGHS

LAST NIGHT'S SESSION AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH EXCELS ALL PREVIOUS ONES.

Three Accessions Are Made at Close of Service—splendid sermon On a Man Up a Tree' Drives Home Truths.

The services at the gospel meetings being conducted by the Fagans at the Christian church are continually on the upgrade. Last evening's session excelled all those preceding in excellence of sermon and response of the audience.

Three accessions at the close of the session were the climax of a most helpful and enjoyable service. Evangelist Fagan preached another great sermon, using the incident in the life of Jesus, recounted in the gospel of Luke, 19th chapter. Zachaeus, the publican of Jericho, would see Jesus and being short of stature he climbed into a sycamore tree near where Jesus must pass by. The evangelist's subject was "A Man Up a Tree." He said in part:

"Zachaeus, the rich, was not popular. He might be called the Shylock of Jericho. He sought to see Jesus, but was hindered by the crowd. Many today in Pendleton would see the Christ but are hindered by the crowd."

"Little Zaech" overcame all difficulties. He was determined to see Jesus and he saw him. Be a man. Don't drift down stream lying in the devil's lap. You can't afford to let anybody or anything keep you from Jesus. Jesus did not pass by—he never will. If you are not saved it is not because Jesus will not save you but because you will not be saved. Contact with Jesus made Zachaeus a better man, evidenced by his penitence and benevolence. These are fundamental characteristics of the Christian life."

The evangelist spoke further of the great blessing that came to the home of this rich publican in Jericho. He remarked: "If I could give the greatest gift to Pendleton it would not be more money for some have too much for their own good now. It would not be the normal located here, as great and as desirable as that is, and I believe Pendleton will get it, but that every home in Pendleton, yea, in the land, might give a Zachaeus welcome to Jesus of Nazareth. The home is the foundation of society and the bulwark of the nation. Jesus as a welcome guest in the home will purify and cleanse all of evil."

He concluded with Christ's own statement, "The Son of Man came to seek and save that which was lost."

Mrs. Fagan sang again last evening to the delight of all. Her solo was, "Shadows." She will sing tonight, "What Will Your Record Be?" In addition, Miss Edna Wisdom of Pilot Rock will sing this evening, giving as her solo, "Unanswered Yet."

Mr. Fagan will preach tonight upon the subject, "Pendleton's Unfolding Detective." Question box has been placed in the vestibule of the church. The public is welcome to use it and all reasonable religious questions will receive courteous treatment by the evangelist.
