Regarding the appointment of members of his family as his deputies.

Until two years ago little, if any objection was ever heard concerning appointment of relatives to office deputyships.

At that time it became noised around that County Clerk Saling was offending the public sense of propriety by employing his daughter as a stenographer.

It is because Mr. Saling had the same opponent then that Mr. Strain has now that this attack is made.

Miss Grace Gilliam, candidate for treasurer, was her father's deputy assessor. R. T. Brown, candidate for county clerk, served about four years as deputy assessor under Geo. Buzan, his brother-in-law.

Also while serving as deputy clerk, Mr. Brown and his wife worked for the county extending taxes. For this they were paid the last year that Mr. Brown served as deputy clerk over \$400.00 in addition to his salary, the work having been done outside of Mr. Brown's regular working hours. And it is reported that his wife will be his deputy should he be elected County Clerk.

B. S. Burroughs, county Recorder, is allowed \$1,500.00 a year to hire office help. His wife helps him from time to time and they employ such other help out of the allowance as is needed.

F. W. Hendley, recorder before Mr. Burroughs, employed his daughter and her husband.

Prof. I. E. Young is allowed \$600.00 a year to hire his office work done. He employed his wife and daughter and such other help as the work requires.
