**CHAMBERLAIN HOME
CONFIDENT OF VICTORY**

Believes Wilson Will Carry State By
Safe Majority—Splendid Business
and Financial Conditions of Coun-
try Pleases People.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 4.—After
a campaign trip through all the coun-
ties of Oregon lying along railway
lines Senator Chamberlain returned
to Portland last night confident that
President Wilson will carry the state
by a safe majority.

"I found Wilson sentiment strong
in southern Oregon and support rap-
idly veering to the president but in
eastern Oregon I found the sentiment
for Wilson even stronger and grow-
ing fast," said Senator Chamberlain.

Wilson's Strength Threefold.
Asked to what he attributed this
strength, he answered:

"First of all to the splendid busi-
ness and financial conditions prevail-
ing in Oregon and the country gen-
erally; second, to the unflinching con-
fidence the people have in Wilson's
constructive work; third, to his bril-
liant diplomatic victories, his able
handling of difficult situations which
has kept the country from becoming
embroiled either with Mexico or in
the titanic European struggle.

Questions for Hughes.
"It is a fact that people generally
in Oregon are asking the questions
put to Hughes the other day by the 29
prominent business men of the coun-
try. That is, would Hughes, if elect-
ed, carry out his threat to wipe all
the constructive legislation of this ad-
ministration off the statute books and
what results could he, or would he
achieve in the field of diplomacy?"

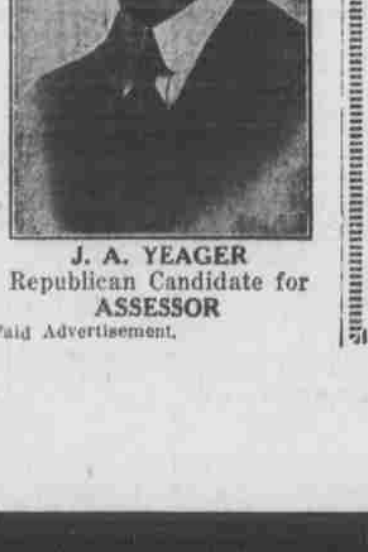
