WOMEN IN RUSSIAN PRISONS. Conditions Getting Better for Inmates, Says Correspondent.

PETROGRAD, Russia, Nov. 11.—Prison conditions in Russia are getting better. George Kennan would rub his eyes in bewilderment if he visited, for instance, the chief women's penitentiary of Moscow. Here the "guests," as they like to be called, have running water in every room. Each cell has electric light, too, to enable the inmate to read after the day's work, the books she has borrowed from the library. If she cannot read she is taught to. The ladies' advisory committee of the prison maintains a school at which illiterates are taught reading and writing for two hours a day. The library contains numerous books by foreign authors.

There are 254 women in the penitentiary, seventy-four being political prisoners who presently are to go into exile. Some of them were brought from Polish prisons during the evolutions last year. Several are "denaturated" women who sold narcotics, semi-poisonous intoxicating drinks, whose chief ingredient was denatured alcohol. Several murdered their husbands. Kazimira O., a lively girl with a simple face, was sentenced in 1908 to be hanged for attempting to assassinate the Russian governor of Warsaw, Scalon. The sentence was remitted to one of life imprisonment.

In the grassy courtyard of the penitentiary play twenty or thirty children, whose mothers are convicts within the walls. Nurses look after them. They are very friendly with the stern warders and call them "Uncle." The prison feeds them; the ladies' welfare committee gives them toys—dolls, balls, horses and carts and Teddy bears. They have far more toys than ordinary village children.

The women work from 7 a. m. until 6 p. m., with a break of two hours for dinner and half an hour for a walk. They work mainly at sewing machines and in the laundry. Eighty sewing machines are doing army work, making dressings and bandages. Their instructors are long term convicts. In the past year the seamstresses have executed orders bringing to the penitentiary 39,000 rubles (about \$19,500). The model laundry, which works mostly for military hospitals, has earned 18,000 rubles (\$9,000) in the past year.

Each woman earns about 50 to 60 kopecks (25 to 30 cents) daily, half of which she is allowed to spend on the little canteen luxuries and half is retained until her term is up. Many leave the prison with 100 rubles (\$50) ample to set a peasant up in a nice little business. When they leave the ladies' advisory committee keeps an eye on them. Those with no relatives or friends go into a home maintained by the committee, while looking for work.

There are twenty-five wardresses and twenty-four warders. Considerable care is shown in the appointments, applicants having to serve first a six month course in the prison course of theoretical and practical training before being considered as prospective warders and wardresses.
