### ESSENTIALS OF SALVATION TOLD

EVANGELIST FAGAN PREACHES ROUSING SERMON ON "WHAT MUST I DO TO BE SAVED?"

Subject for Tonight's Revival Meeting at Christian Church Will Be "Conversion."

This vital question was Evangelist Fagan's theme last evening at the Christian Church revival meetings. It was handled in a clear, convincing way. A harmony of the three answers given this important question, as it was asked upon three different occasions in N. T. history as given in the book of Acts, the book of conversion. Mr. Fagan stated in part:

"In the sixteenth chapter of Acts, verse 30th, the Phillippian jailor asked, 'What must I do to be saved?'

Paul replied, 'Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and in order that he could believe he preached the gospel unto him and unto his house. The jailor having heard the gospel believed it, repented of his sins and was baptized the same hour of the night (midnight).'

"On the day of Pentecost they, the Jews, asked of the apostles, 'What must we do?' Peter said, 'Repent ye and be baptized, every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit.' Having heard and believed the gospel before asking the question, they were instructed to take the next two steps—repentance and baptism.

"Saul on the road to Damascus, asked: 'Lord, what must I do?' The Lord said: 'Go into the city and it shall be told thee what thou must do.' Ananias was sent to instruct him in the way of salvation and he said: 'Now, why tarriest thou? Arise and be baptized and wash away the sins calling upon the name of the Lord.' Saul, having heard the gospel, believed it, repented, was commanded to take the next step, baptism.

"Thus we see in these three answers to the question there is no conflict. They all traveled the same road. The answer in each instance depends upon the condition of the one asking the question.

The subject for tonight is "Conversion." The evangelist promises a clear, interesting and scriptural explanation of the theme.

Mrs. Fagan sang a great gospel solo to the delight of all, entitled, "The Old Fountain."
