prohibiting employment of married women at night. The statute of 1904 followed the state factory investigation. It was once held unconstitutional by the New York court of appeals and later was sustained. The law provides that "no female shall be employed in any factory before 4 a. m. or after 9 p. m., or for more than ten hours a day except to make a shorter work day on Saturday or for more than sixty hours a week."

CHILD HELD BECAUSE OF BILL FOR BOARD
Indignant Judge Signs Habeas Corpus Writ at Request of Little One's Mother.
HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 21.—To hold a child as security for a small board bill doesn't appeal to Judge Milton A. Shumway. He signed a writ of habeas corpus under

which Mr. and Mrs. James A. Roberts of Manchester produced in court this afternoon Anna Louise Parsons, six-year-old daughter of Mrs. Ida Parsons Molmphy of New Haven.
Counsel for the Roberts family was given until tomorrow to file an answer to the mother's demand for the return of her child and Judge Shumway continued the hearing until Friday afternoon.
It appeared that before her second

marriage Mrs. Molmphy worked for the Roberts family and became indebted to them for board for herself and child, whose father died in an insane asylum three years after the birth of Anna Louise. It was claimed that Mrs. Roberts provided money to bring the child from Plainfield, N. J., to Manchester, and that she was the only mother the little girl had ever known.
Judge Shumway said: "The board bill has nothing to do with this case."
