HOGS AGAIN SHOW FIRMER PRICES

PORTLAND, Nov. 24.—The hog market is again firm with sales as high as \$9.85 again in the North Portland yards. The trade here made a change in its buying method on hogs for the day, prime heavy stuff selling at an advance over prime light.

There was a later fair run of hogs in the yards overnight, but demand was excellent at the better prices.

General hog market: Prime heavy weights \$9.75@9.85; Prime light weights \$9.55@9.65; Good light weights \$9.40@9.50; Medium weights \$9.25@9.35; Rough heavy \$8.00@8.50.

Cattle Continue Firm. While there was only a small run of cattle reported in the North Portland yards overnight, and there was nothing to test extreme quotations, the market nevertheless showed every indication of retaining the former full strength and prices.

General cattle market range: Prime heavy steers \$7.25@7.35; Prime light steers \$7.00@7.15; Good steers \$6.50@6.75; Medium steers \$6.25@6.45; Ordinary steers \$5.80@6.10; Common steers \$5.40@5.75; Prime cows \$5.50@5.75; Prime heifers \$5.00@5.35; Good cows \$4.75@5.15; Ordinary cows \$4.00@4.25; Common cows \$3.80@4.25; Prime heavy bulls \$4.25@4.50; Good bulls \$4.00@4.25; Ordinary bulls \$3.00@3.25; Best light calves \$7.00; Ordinary calves \$6.00@6.50; Poor calves \$5.00@5.75.

BRILLIANT CAREER ENDS AT POOR FARM

Ralph M. Dement, Once Leader of Bar, Broke Down Ten Years Ago.

PORTLAND, Nov. 24.—Ralph M. Dement died at the Multnomah poor farm, yesterday. When his father died in the late '80s and left him a large estate, Dement was one of the most promising young lawyers in the state. Then fortune smiled at him. Later he entered upon a career that caused his downfall.

Dement was born in Oregon City July 27, 1856. He was named after Ralph Wilcox, the first school teacher in Portland. He was educated in the public schools of San Francisco and graduated from Columbia University, Washington, D. C. in 1875. Two years later he received a degree from the law department of the same college. After two years in the federal service he came back to Oregon.

He went into politics, formed a partnership with John H. Mitchell, later United States senator, and was one of his strongest supporters. The firm's offices were at First and Morrison streets.

"Representative Men of Oregon," a book published in the early '80s, described Dement as one of the most promising young attorneys in the state. It credited him with the ability, the nerve and the ambition to make him successful. Dement was appointed police judge by Mayor John Gates. He served from 1885 to 1888. In 1888 he ran against John Catlin for county judge, and lost.

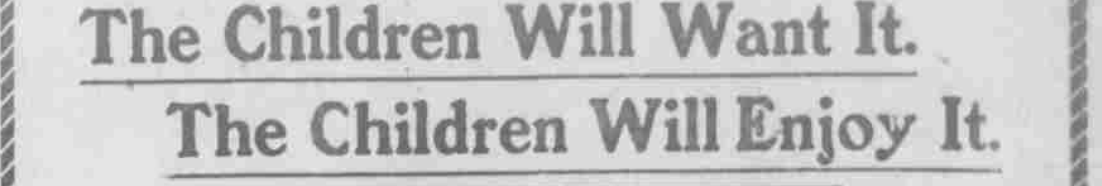
