CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—Golf, according to a decision by Judge Jesse A. Baldwin in the circuit court today, is a "beneficial recreation," rather than an "amusement."

The decision frees Mary A. Condon, an executrix of the estate of John Condon, owner of the old Harlem racetrack, from paying an annual amusement license fee of \$750 a year for the public golf links which now wadorn the former race park.

CITY EMPLOYEES MUST NOT DRINK

Joplin, Mo., Dec. 5.—All city employees of Joplin were forbidden to "drink intoxicating liquors at any time," in a resolution adopted unanimously by the Joplin city commission in executive session here yesterday.

Five city firemen are said to have resigned immediately as a protest against the "dry" order. Their places were filled.

The commission also passed an ordinance forbidding display of cigarette and liquor advertisements in motion picture theatres.

Mrs. Layman is the first woman to be named as a presidential elector in the state.

CLERK SPENT \$5,000 A MONTH AND IS \$100,000 SHORT

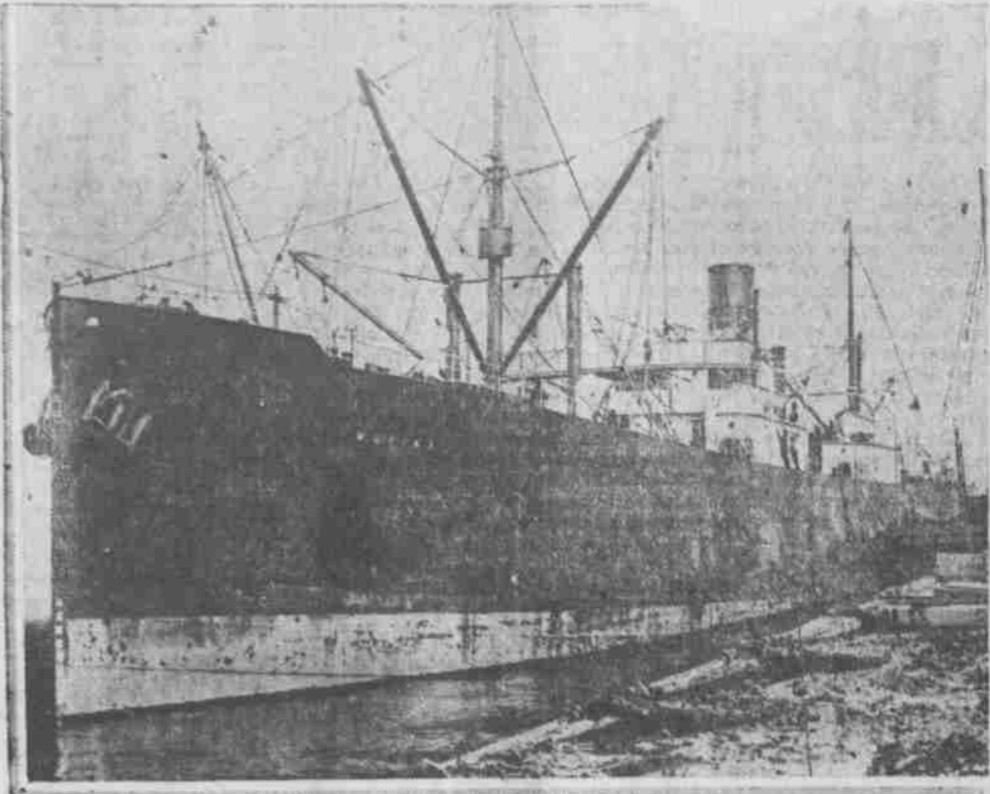
NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—"My salary was \$25 a week and my living expenses were \$5,000 a month."

This was the excuse Adolph Loeffler, a young Austrian who for six years has been employed in the export department of Francis H. Leggett & Co., gave yesterday for thefts extending over two years and totaling according to Loeffler's confession, almost \$100,000.

For the last two months Loeffler has been living in an eight room apartment for which he paid \$150 a month. He kept several servants, including a chauffeur, to drive his six-cylinder automobile.
