Mabel Taliaferro Starred in "The Dawn of Love."

Giblyn went to San Francisco ostensibly for the purpose of photographing scenes aboard the boat, but arriving there he realized that he had to produce a number of scenes within a "Barbary Coast" dance-hall. "We'll get some good atmosphere and suggestions by going to the coast," he thought, and mentioned the fact to members of the company. They promptly agreed with the director, and the entire company started out to "do" the "coast."

"I have read about people going 'slumming,'" said Miss Dalton to Giblyn, while the party was wending its way through the maze of dimly lighted streets and alleys, "but I had no idea that this was what it was like. I'm just a trifle 'skeered'."

The "atmosphere" of the "coast" is said to have aided materially in the production of the dance-hall scenes.

Joseph Brooks, famous theatrical manager, who became known to the general public as the producer of "Ben Hur" and "In Old Kentucky," jumped from his home on the eighth floor of a New York apartment house and was instantly killed. He was a victim of nervous prostration due to overwork.

NEGRO SLAYER FREED; MOTHER GOOD LAUNDRESS

J. D. Perry Francis, son of Ambassador, Will Have Charge of His Washerwoman's Son.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 5.—Thomas Elliot, a negro, 35 years old, who was sentenced to the penitentiary March 27 of last year to serve 1 year for murder in the second degree, will leave the prison at Jefferson City tomorrow. He was paroled today by Governor Major to J. D. Perry Francis of 451 Maryland avenue, son of David R. Francis, ambassador to Russia. Francis gained the negro's release. When asked by a Post Dispatch reporter about it he said: "My only interest in the man comes from the fact that his mother has been my laundress for 12 years—and a darned good one. I did know the details of the crime he committed, but I have forgotten them."

Elliot shot and killed Powell Hubbard, 52 years old, another negro, in a fight in front of his home, 2789 Wabash street, May 24, 1913. He fired five shots at Hubbard, two of which took effect, when the older negro rushed at him with a knife.

242 NORWEGIAN SHIPS HAVE BEEN DESTROYED

CHRISTIANIA, Dec. 5. — From the beginning of the war until November of this year, 242 Norwegian ships have been destroyed by acts of war. These included 182 steamers of 251,628 tons. The vessels were insured for 145,000,000 kroner.
